Robbery At Post Office

Sometime last week the Chugiak Post Office was robbed, but fortunately the victim was not the United States mail, but Postmaster Paul Swanson.

Sometime, when the Post Office was closed, a sneak thief stole one of the guns which Paul had displayed in the lobby of the Post Office.

Paul said the gun-- a 10 guage sibtgun--was worth very little as a firearm, but had considerable sentimental value as an heirloom, having belonged to his father.

Apparently the thief was familiar with the postoffice, as he would have had to reach over the top of the foaming partition which is drawn across the lobby during the hours the Post Office is closed, and removed the gun from the rafter where it had been hanging.

The Cook of the Month

We are always delighted when our Cook of the Month is of foreign origin, for then we can look forward to many unusual and tasty recipes.

Our cook for August, Christa Burg, was born in Berlin Germany and lived there until her marriage to an American Serviceman in 1952.

Dick Burg was stationed in Nuremburg when he and Christa were married, and was rotated back to the states immediately afterward.

Dick had been stationed at Whittier Alaska in 1948, and had at that time made up his mind that Alaska would some day be his home. So after only three months in New York City, the Burgs were discharged from the Army and drove to Alaska.

For a while they lived in Anchorage area and on Ft. Richardson (Dick having reenlisted) and then in 1954, they arrived in Chugiak to live on their Birchwood home-site.

Christa's principal hobby has developed into a thriving little business, which does serve to keep her rather tied down. She operates the Birchwood Kennels, where she raises pure-bred German Shepherd dogs, in addition to boarding pets.

Christa said that she had no previous experience in this line, merely liked dogs, and discovered that when she offered to board pets for ot-

ROTE GRÜTZE

- 1 quart fruit juice (currant raspberry or cherry)
- 1 generous cup tapioca
- 1 cup sugar

COOK currants a few min. MASH through strainer

STIR the previously soaked tapioca and other ingredients with juice until thickened.

Proposed by Initiative Petition No. 1

for an act entitling MOVING CAPITAL TO COOK INLET-RAILBELT AREA

(summary of proposition)

It is proposed that on and after January 1, 1965, the Capital of the State of Alaska, which is by Section 20 of Article XV of the State Constitution located in Juneau, be relocated within the Cook Inlet-Railbelt area.

The exact location within this area is to be selected by a committee of five to be appointed by the Governor.

LANDMARK TO BE MOVED

A Tok landmark for travelers of the Alaska Highway will be moved from its present location, Governor Egan had learned.

Egan and Senator E. L. Bartlett (almost it seems since the beginning of time) have been conducting a campaign with the Bureau of the Customs and other government agencies for improvement of the Tok facilities, including relocation of the customs station 90 miles nearer the U.S. Canada border, and round-the-clock operation of the station.

Bartlett's office in Washington, D.C., has advised the Governor of their initial victory.

A copy of a letter received from D.B. Staubinger, acting commissioner of customs, said in part:

"...I have authorized the collector to proceed with relocation of the outhouse."

The structure, now used for storage, will be relocated against the rear of the existing office building.

SHOOTERS PLAGUE HOMESTEADER

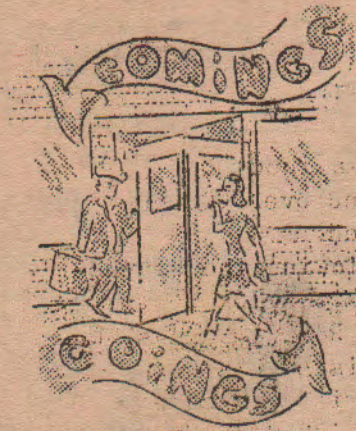
Mrs. Paul Jones finally had

All former residents of the State of Minnesota are invited.

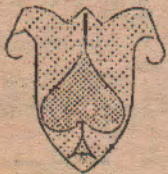
One of the features planned for the event is a straw vote on the coming Presidential election. It is quite likely the vote will be an indication of how the state of Minnesota will vote in the fall election.

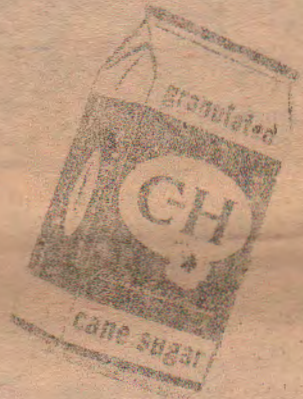
