Therefor, they should welcome the news that they can now deposit their soiled laundry at the Washeteria, and pick them up at a later time nicely washed and dried.


This service will probably be a boon to many working mothers who find it hard to get the family washing done along with their other duties.

Cur cook for August, Christa Burg, was born in Berlin Germany and lived there until her marriage to an American Serviceman in 1952.

It is proposed that on and after January 1, 1965, the Capital of the State of Alaska, which is by Section 20 of Article XV of the State Constitution located in Juneau, be relocated within the Cook Inlet-Railbelt area.

LANDMARK TO BE MOVED

A Tok landmark for travelers of the Alaska Highway will be moved from its present location, Govern or Egan had learned.

Egan and Senator E. L. Bartlett (almost it seems since the beginning of time) have been conducting a campaign with the Bureau of the Customs and other government agencies for improvement of the Tok facilities, including re-location of the customs station 90 miles nearer the U.S. Canada border, and round-the-clock operation of the station.

Bartlett's office in Washington, D.C., has advised the Governor of their initial victory.

A copy of a letter received from D.B. Staubinger, acting commissioner of customs, said in part:

"...I have authorized the collector to proceed with relocation of the outhouse."

The structure, now used for storage, will be reloc-ated against the rear of the existing office building.


