Bruce Robinson, president of the Chugiak Benefit Association has announced that workers are still needed to help operate the booth at the State Fair this weekend.

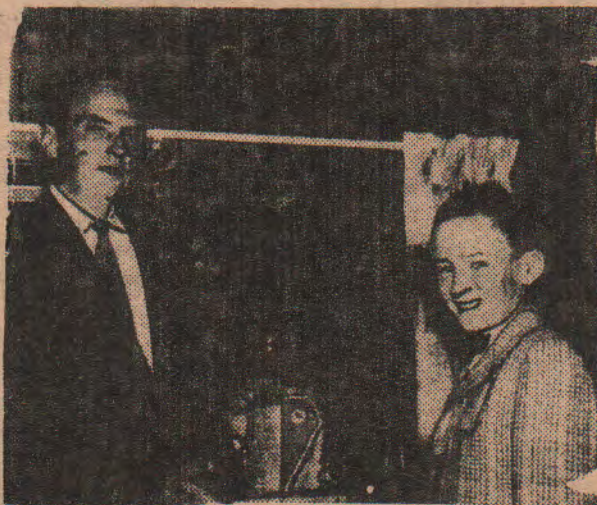
It was hoped that enough money could be earned at the Fair to enable CBA to pay off the organizations which still have money due from the past Carnival.

HIGH SCHOOL BUSES SCHEDULED

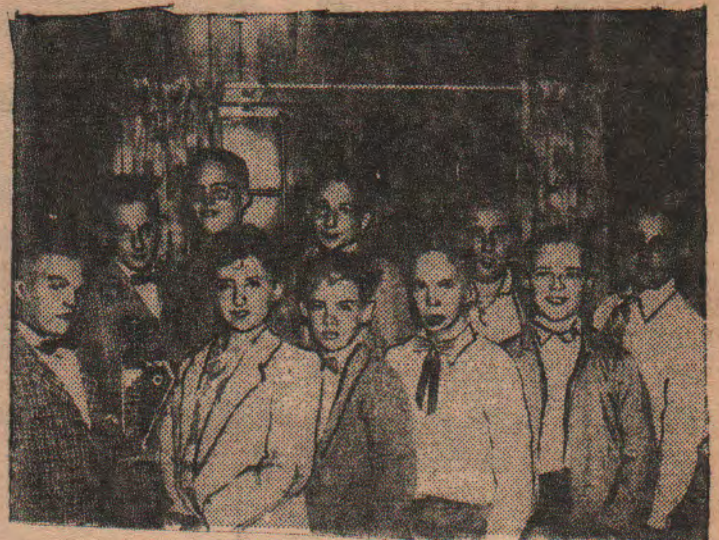
Once again, there will be two buses to transport high school students from Chugiak to Anchorage.

TEEN-AGERS URGED TO RETURN TO SCHOOL

JUNEAU: Alaska Labor Commissioner has urged the state's teenagers to return to school this fall and complete their high school education.

In a message aimed at Alaska's young people, Johnson said, "Some of you have worked this (next col.)

(teenagers)

summer. I hope you have found your job profitable and instructive. However, let me urge you not to become enamoured of that pay-check that you fail to return to school this fall and complete your education.

Johnson said national statistics reveal that young people dropping out of school have a harder time finding jobs, suffer more prolonged periods of unemployment, are paid less and promoted more slowly than their friends who finish school.

"In this age of the missile, jobs with a future require more basic education than ever before," he said.

Under Alaskan laws, returning to school does not prevent most youth from working at a suitable job outside school hours. Many jobs are open to youth 16 and over.

Youngsters of 14 and 15 may work at most jobs for up to 23 hours each week. However, under 16 students must hold part-time jobs only between the hours of 6 am and 7 pm.

In addition, next month the Alaska State Employment Service will again offer its fac-

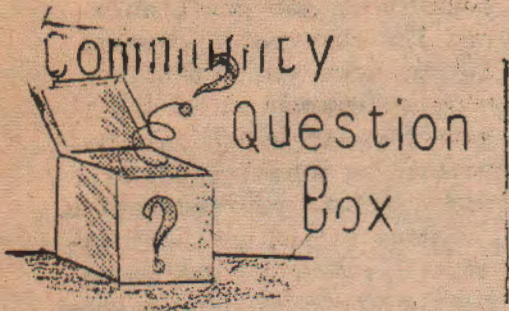

TAGGED FISH RECAPTURED



QUESTION:

Now that Chugiak no longer has a Public Health Nurse, may residents of the community take their children to the Health Center in Anchorage for shots?

ANSWER:

Yes, Mrs. Ralph Long, President of the Chugiak Health Council has given us this information.

Residents of Chugiak may take advantage of the immunization clinic and the chest, clinic, but are not eligible for well-baby clinics.

Immunization shots are given at the Health Center at 217 E Street in Anchorage, on Fridays from 9 am to 11am and from 1pm to 3pm.

Immunization for international travel are given any day from 8am to 4 pm.

The chest clinic is Tuesdays, from 1 to 2 pm.

Mrs. Long stated that as yet she has not learned when Chugiak will be assigned a nurse to replace Miss Mary Rowley, who transferred to Sitka.

She was told by the Health Service that they are attempting to recruit a nurse to fill the vacancy, and will assign a nurse as soon as one can be found.

Any Chugiak residents who may not have a record of immunization shots that their children may have received from Miss Rowley, may get that (cont col 3)

ilities to students seeking after school jobs.

The agency will register students and handle calls from employers for student workers.

Among the jobs available during the school year are those of delivering newspapers, baby sitting, mowing lawns, delivery boys and stock room boys.

The employment service staff also will be appearing before civic and parent-teacher organizations urging that Alaska's teenagers youth stay in school and outlining the job finding operation of the agency.

A black cod, or sable fish, tagged and released by Alaska Department of Fisheries, research personnel eight years ago off Cape Spencer was re-captured in the same area this month by Erling Onsoin, a commercial fisherman from San Pedro, Dr. William Smoker, Chief Biological Research reported.

The tagged fish was reported by Fred Grand, fish buyer for Engstrom Brothers, at Pelican Alaska.

In spite of the long period since it was tagged, the black cod apparently did not travel or grow very much.

It was thirty inches long in 1952 and thirty three inches in 1960.

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game research is demonstrating that the tendency to remain in one area and to show very slow growth is typical of the black cod of this size, Dr. Smoker stated.

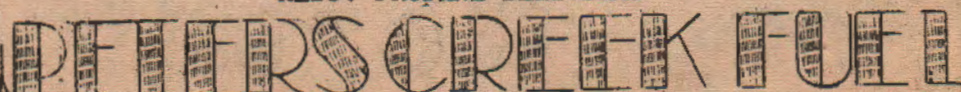

The Cook of The Month

- COOK FOR AUGUST -

CHRISTA BURE

For her final recipe, Christa gives us a traditional German Cheese Cake, that is rich and fancy enough to be suitable for a special dessert or party refreshment.

CHEESE CAKE

- 12 tbs cake flour
- 1 level tsp baking powder
- 6 tbs sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- small amount of milk or water
- 4 tbs butter or oleo

CHEESE FILLING

- 2 cartons cottage cheese
- 14 tbs sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 3 eggs separated
- small amt milk
- 2 tbs cornstarch or 1 of vanilla pudding.

SIFT flour with baking powder in a medium bowl
 MAKE hile in center and
 ADD egg yolk, sugar & liquid
 MIX with part of flour
 CUT butter into small pieces
 WORK quickly into by hand to make pliable dough which must rest for 30 minutes in cool place.

PREPARE cheese filling as foll.
 PRESS cheese through seive(fine)
 ADD sugar, vanilla pudding or cornstarch, egg yolks (3) and enough milk to make a nice smooth heavy creme.

FINALLY add 1/2 cup currants (opt)
 FOLD in well beated egg whites

LAY out a 10 x 2 inch spring form (or pan of equal size)
 PLACE dough on bottom and fomr 1 inch rim around the sides
 Punch holes in (next col.)

(cook of the month)

bottom crust and scatter thinly with bread crumbs to prevent bottom crust from becomming soaked.
 POUR in cheese mixture
 BAKE at 325° for 1 hour
 SHUT OFF oven heat, but allow to cool in closed oven to prevent falling.

DUCK HUNTERS REMINDED TO BUY STAMPS

James W. Brooks, Chief of the Division of Game, Alaska Department of Fish and Game, has reminded all hunters of migratory birds, who are 16 years or older that they are required to carry a validated (next col)

(duck stamps)

Federal Migratory Bird Hunting Stamp as well as an Alaska state hunting license, when hunting ducks, geese, brant, coot or jacksnipe.

The waterfowl season opens throughout Alaska on Thursday, September 1st.

Al Bloomquist, Licensing Supervisor for the Department reported that many people are sending money for these stamps to the Department of Fish and Game office, rather than purchasing them at post offices.

This is creating quite a pproblem in his office, Bloomquist said; as all money must be returned to the senders.

Only post offices are authorized to sell the "Duck Stamps". These stamps cost three dollars each and must be validated by the hunter after purchase, bu signing his or her name in ink across the face of the stamp.


CLASS "A" LUNCHES AT SCHOOL

Newcomers to Chugiak, or those who will be sending a child to the Chugiak school for the first time this year, will be pleased to know that hot lunches are available at the school cafeteria.

These lunches are of the class "A" variety and all menus are approved by the board of education.

Lunches may be purchased by the day at the rate of 55¢ a lunch for students and 65¢ for teachers; or weekly meal tickets may be purchased.

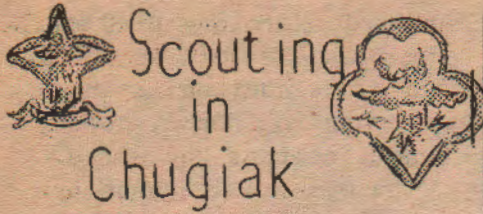

There may be those who prefer to send a lunch to school with their children, but who would like to purchase fresh milk at the lunch room.

Milk tickets are available at \$1.40 for a month, or may be purchased daily at .08¢ per ½ pint carton.

Lunch tickets for teachers are \$2.75 per week.

Lunch money is collected each Monday, with a deadline of Tuesday, after which meals may be paid for on a single meal rate only.

Lunch will be served on the second day of school, September 7th. The charge for the week (which will consist of only three days) will be \$1.35 per child.

ANYONE NEED AN ENGINE?

When Chugiak Postmaster Paul Swanson picked up a bargain at the local surplus store, he got more than he bargained for.

Paul purchased a large steel tank of the type that aircraft engines are stored in, planning to make it into an oil storage container.

However he found this can still contained an aircraft engine.

Now Paul is rather puzzled as to what to do with a 3000 horsepower engine, which probably originally cost the government around \$15,000 dollars.
