## Chugiak to Elect Local School Board

Nominations for members to serve as an advisory school board were made at the meeting of the Chugiak PTA at their first meeting.

In compliance with a law passed at the last legislature, every state operated school outside incorporated towns, is to have such a board, consisting of three members, whose duties are the same as those formerly held by the school agent.

Mr. Lee Emmert, school superintendent, explained that due to the short notice given him of this election, he was calling for nominations at the PTA meeting, rather than calling a separate meeting for the purpose.

Notice of the election must be posted no later than the third Monday of September, and the election itself held no earlier than two weeks, or later than four weeks after the notice had been posted.

Five candidates to the board were nominated, whose names will appear on the ballot, with space for write in candidates provided.

Nominated were, Bruce Robinson, Mrs. Allen Davis, Mrs. Russell Oberg, Rev. Wayne Hull, and Paul Swanson.

The day and place of the election will be announced in the next issue of the Courier, and notices posted at numerous places in the community.

Only registered voters, those who voted in the August primary are eligible to vote in this election.

Volunteers will be sought to act in the capacity of election judges and officials.

PARENTS GROUP NEEDED

Recent conversation with  
parents of Chugiak High Sch-  
ool Students points to a need  
for an organization of high  
school parents to help re-  
solve some of the problems  
peculiar to this community.

These parents have found  
that upon the graduation of  
their children to high sch-  
ool that they no longer have  
the authority of the Chugiak  
Parents and Teachers Assoc-  
iation when they have ques-  
tions concerning bus transport-  
ation etc.

Those who have attended the  
meetings of the high school  
PTA have discovered that the  
problems of the Chugiak stu-  
dents are entirely different  
from those residing in the  
independent school district,  
and that the Anchorage people  
are less than sympathetic to  
our needs.

This leaves the local par-  
ents in need of a voice to  
bring their mutual problems  
to the proper authorities.

Several of the mothers  
and fathers have been con-  
sidering organizing a group  
of parents of high school  
students who can meet and  
discuss the items which  
have been troubling them

(parents group)

and determining a means of  
bringing them to the proper  
ears.

This would fill the need  
for a high school PTA for  
this area, since it would  
at least have the weight  
of more than one voice and  
a representative of this  
group might be able to en-  
list the interest of the  
High School PTA in our pro-  
blems, or if not, then take  
them to the proper school  
authorities.

These problems are not  
all new ones, but as the  
number of students increas-  
es, so do problems, and  
it is time that something  
is done about them.

Chugiak high schoolers  
feel somewhat like step-  
children in Anchorage, and  
many have said that they  
have been not treated fair-  
ly. It is only by a defin-  
ite authorized group that  
these matters can be br-  
ought to light and correct-  
ed.

# Cook of the Month

COOK FOR SEPTEMBER  
ESTHER HULL

Esther Hull has learned, as have most busy housewives, that a pressure cooker is a girl's best friend.

Her recipe for Swiss Steak is a family favorite, and is especially delicious when moose or caribou are used.

## SWISS STEAK

- 2# round or rump beef or game cut 1/2 inches thick.
- 4 tbs. flour
- 1 tsp salt
- Dash pepper
- 2 tbs melted fat
- 1/2 cups canned or fresh tomatoes
- 4 medium onions, sliced
- 1 cup diced celery
- 1 peeled garlic clove
- 1 tbs Worcestershire sauce
- Few drops tabasco sauce
- 1/2 cup rice
- 1/2 cups water

COMBINE flour, seasonings & POUND half of mixture into one side of meat  
 CUT meat into serving pieces  
 HEAT fat in pressure cooker  
 BROWN beef quickly on both sides  
 PLACE on rack  
 ADD remaining ingredients  
 COVER pan and  
 COOK under pressure for 15 minutes  
 REDUCE pressure with cool water  
 SIMMER uncovered 3 to 5 minutes to thicken sauce  
 SERVE on platter with gravy over and around meat.

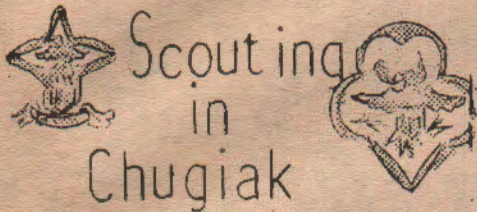

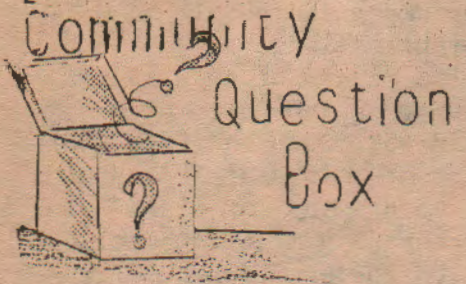

However, they must call at the Post Office to see if they have any mail, as the postmaster is not permitted to send out notices for this sort of thing.

This also applies to patrons on any part of the Star Route who do not wish to go into Anchorage to pick up packages.

The private phone line which is reserved for the Chugiak Fire Company is encountering a number of difficulties lately.

Due to an action of the phone company, the phone is able to be used only for incoming calls, but does not permit calls to be made from it.

This presents the problem of how to notify the individual fireman when an emergency call or fire call is received.

Under this set-up, it is necessary to go to another private phone to relay the fire calls, losing valuable time.

Also, a place to locate the fire phone is needed.

The phone, which is at present located in the home of one of the fireman, will have to be moved soon, and a new location is being sought.

It would have to be located in the vicinity of the MTA substation at mile 17, and in such a place where it would have 24 hour surveillance. A business-residence would be the answer.
