## Chugiak to Elect Local School Board

Nominations for members to serve as an advisory school board were made at the meeting of the Chugiak PTA at their first meeting.

In compliance with a law passed at the last legislature, every state operated school outside incorporated towns, is to have such a board, consisting of three members, whose duties are the same as knose formerly held by the school agent.

Mr. Lee Emmert, school superintendent, explained that due to the short notice given him of this election, he was calling for hominations at the PTA meeting, rather than calling a separate meeting for the purpose.

Notice of the election must be posted no later than the third Monday of September, and the election itself held no earlier than two weeks, or later than four weeks after the notice had been posted.

Five candidates to the board were nominated, whose names will appear on the ballot, with space for write in candidates provided.

Nominated were, Bruce Robinson, Mrs. Allen Davis, Mrs. Russell Oberg, Rev. Wayne Hull, and Paul Swanson.

The day and place of the election will be announced in the next issue of the Courier, and notices posted at numerous places in the community.

Only registered voters, those who voted in the August primary are eligible to vote in this election.

#### PARENTS GROUP NEEDED

Recent conversation with parents of Chugiak High School Students points to a need for an organization of high school parents to help resolve some of the problems peculiar to this community.

These parents have found that upon the graduation of their children to high school that they no longer have the authority of the Chugiak Parents and Teachers Association when they have questions concerning bus transportation etc.

Those who have attended the meetings of the high school PTA have discovered that the problems of the Chugiak students are entirely different from those residing in the independent school district, and that the Anchorage people are less than sympathetic to our needs.

This leaves the local parents in need of a voice to bring their mutual problems to the proper authorities.

Several of the mothers and fathers have been considering organizing a group of parents of high school students who can meet and discuss the items which have been troubling them (andt next col) (parents group)

and determining a means of bringing them to the proper ears.

This would fill the need for a high school PTA for this area, since it would at least have the weight of more than one voice and a representative of this group might be able to enlist the interest of the High School PTA in our problems, or if not, then take them to the proper school authorities.

These problems are not all new ones, but as the number of students increa% (se'; so do problems, and it is time that something is done about them.

Chugiak high schoolers feel somewhat like step-children in Anchorage, and many have said that they have been not treated fairly. It is only by a definite authorized group that these matters can be brought to light and corrected.



#### SWISS STEAK

2# round or rump beef or game gut 11/2 inches thick. 4 tbs. flour 1 tsp salt Dash pepper 2 tbs melted fat 11/2 cups canned or fresh tomatoes Johnson. 4 medium onions, sliced 1 cup diced celery l peeled garlic clove 1 tbs Worschestershire sauce Few drops tabasco sauce 1/2 cup rice 1½ cups water

COMBINE flour, seasonings & POUND Half of mixture into one side of meat CUT meat into serving pieces HEAT fat in pressure cooker BROWN beef quickly on both sides PLACE on rack ... Under this set-up, it is necessary to go to another private phone to relay the fire calls, losing valuable time.

Also, a place to locate the fire phone is needed.

The phone, which is at present located in the home of one of the fireman, will have to be moved soon, and a new location is being saught.

It would have to be located in the vicinity of the NTA substation at mile 17, and in such a place where it would have 24 hour surveillance. A business-residence would be the answer.


