Obedience Training Classes May Be Held Here

The Obedience Training Club of Anchorage, which met at Burg's Birchwood Kennels on last Saturday, has decided to hold obedience training classes in Chugiak, if enough people from the community will sign up.

The ten week course will cost \$15, which will help cover the rental of a suitable building, probably the Chugiak Carnival Hall. The group would meet once a week probably on a Sunday afternoon, or evening. It would require at least fifteen applicants from this community before the classes could begin.

Date Set For Election of School Board

The date for the election of an advisory school board for Chugiak has been set for Oct. 4th, Mr. Lee Emmert, school superintendent announced today.

The procedure for the election will be different than was earlier announced due to a later interpretation of the state law.

Instead of an all day election to be held at a specified polling place, the election will take place at an open meeting, at which time an explanation of the law and the duties of the board will be read. Also at that time any questions pertaining to the subject will be answered, and further nominations will be accepted.

The meeting will take place at 8 pm on the above mentioned date at the Chugiak Carnival Hall, at mile 21.

A list will be on hand of the registered voters in the community (those who voted at the August primary) and arrangements will be made to register those who either did not register in August, or who are residents of the Chugiak School District, but not of the Chugiak precinct.

The Chugiak School District is defined as being from the western boundry of Fort Richardson, to the eastern boundry of the Eklutna FAA station and from the top of the Chugach mountains to the Knik Arm and from the mouth of Eagle River, to the Eagle River glacier.

Mr. Emmert stated that the meeting will be as brief as possible in order that the

BEST DOUGHNUTS

- 2 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 tbs melted shortening
- 3½ to 4 cups flour
- ½ tsp salt
- 4 tsp baking powder
- ¼ tsp nutmeg
- ¼ tsp cinnamon
- 1 cup milk

BEAT eggs & sugar together
 ADD cooled shortening
 ADD sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk
 ROLL on lightly floured surface to ½ inch thick
 CUT with doughnut cutter
 FRY in deep hot fat (375°) until brown
 DRAIN on absorbent paper
 SERVE plain or rolled in sugar
 MAKES 40 doughnuts

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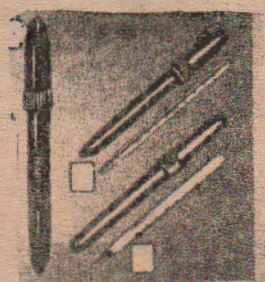

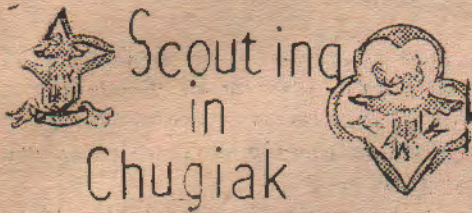

GAME VIOLATIONS PROSECUTED

In a recent Kodiak court case, three men were fined \$250 each for the wanton waste of elk meat, the Department of Fish and Game has announced.

The men, Fred A. Greer, Wayne E Lillie and Richard (next col.)

(violators)

N. Talbott, all of Kodiak were apprehended by Herbert L. Downing, an officer of the Division of Protection of the Department of Fish and Game, following their abandonment of elk meat at Tonki Cape on Afognak Island.

The men were found guilty by Judge Mabel Fenner of Kodiak on Sept. 6th. \$150 of each fine was suspended and the hunting licenses of the three men were revoked for the remainder of 1960.

In Copper Center, Jack H. Pruitt of Fairbanks was fined \$750 for killing a cow moose and her two female calves on the Denali Highway.

Pruitt, who pleaded guilty to a complaint signed by Protection Officer William Sholes of Glennallen, stated that he had mistaken the moose for caribou.

Judge Carl Eden of Copper Center ordered Pruitt's 1960 hunting license and a rifle owned by him forfeited to the State. \$300 of the fine was suspended on condition that Pruitt does not buy another hunting license for a period of two years.

The moose carcasses, which were recovered, were donated to the Valdez Children's Home.

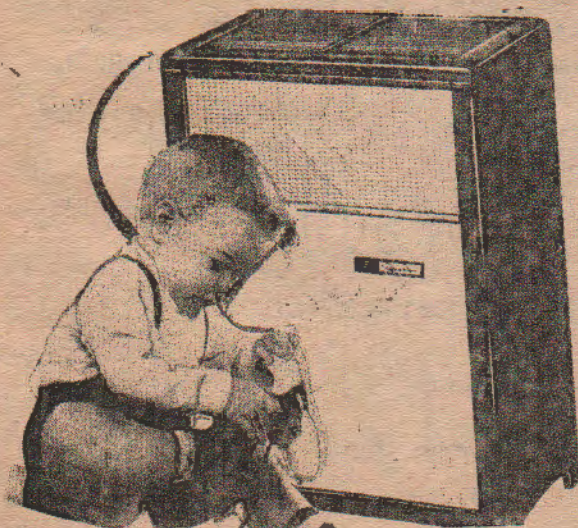

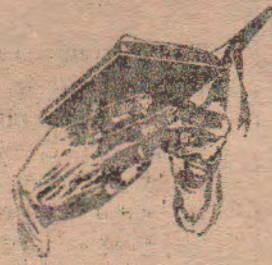

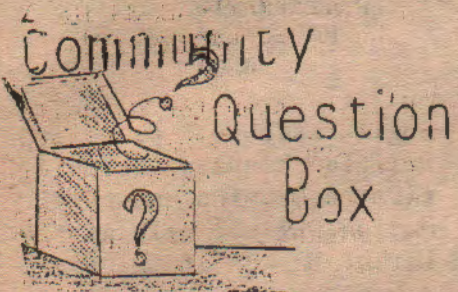

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QUESTION:

".....can a person who was eligible to vote at the August primary but failed to do so, vote in the November general election, and where can they register?"

ANSWER:

To be considered a legal voter in Alaska, one must be a resident of the State for one year, and in the precinct for thirty days. Those who failed to register by voting in the August primary, or who were not eligible at that time, but will be in November will be given the opportunity to register at the time of the general election and may vote."

STATE SEARCHES FOR LAND

A search for land patented

place during July and August,
according to a report in the
August issue of "Alaska Land
Lines," a publication of the
Department of Natural Resour-

Inspection of soil survey
maps and lands in the area

River and south of Deception
Creek disclosed that most of
that area which is in the
western part of the Matanuska
Valley is poorly suited for
farming.

Underneath a shallow layer

gether by dense glacial silt.

These lands are definitely
not suitable for agriculture
and the search agricultural
land will continue during the
coming months in the hope
that suitable land can be
made available for homestead-
ing under the State's land

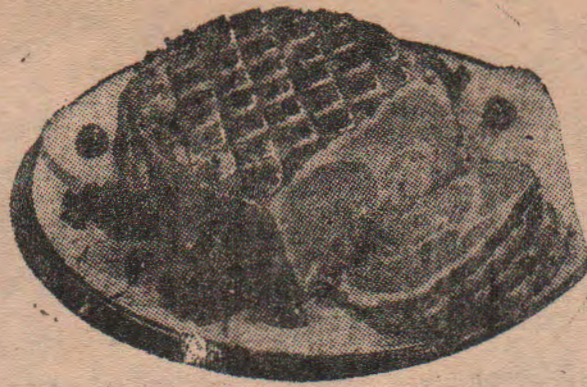

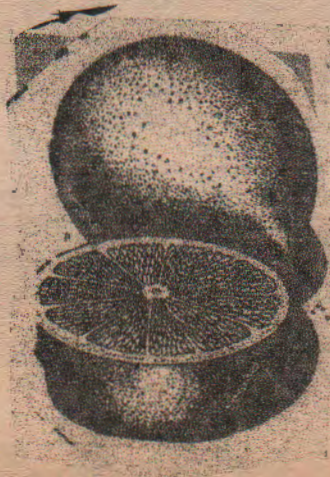
