The date for the election of an advisory school board for Chugiak has been set for Oct. 4th, Mr. Lee Emmert, school superintendent announced today.

The procedure for the election will be different than was earlier announced due to a later interpretation of the state law.

Instead of an all day election to be held at a specif ied polling place, the electtion will take place at an open meeting, at which time an explaination of the law and the duties of the board will be read. Also at that time any questions pertaining to the subject will be answered, and further nominations will be accepted.

The meeting will take place at 8 pm on the above mentioned date at the Chugiak Carnival Hall, at mile 21.

A list will be on hand the registered voters in the community (those who voted at the August primary) and arrangements will be made to registered those who either did not register in August, or who are residents of the Chugiak School District, but not of the Chugiak precinct.
The Chugiak School Jistrict

is defined as being from the western boundry of Fort Richardson, to the eastern boundry of the Eklutna FAA station and from the top of the Chugach mountains to the Knik Arm and from the mouth of Eagle River, to the Eagle River glacier.

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

GAME VIOLATIONS
PROSECUTED

In a recent Kidiak court case, three men were fined \$250 each for the wanton waste of elk meat, the Department of Fish and Game has announced.

The men, Fred A. Greer, Mayne E Lillie and Richard (next col.) (violators)

N. Talbott, all of Kodiak were apprehended by Herbert L. Downing, an officer of the Division of Protection of the Department of Fish and Game, following their abandonment of elk meat at Tonki Cape on Afognak Island.

The men were found guilty by Judge Mabel Fenner of Kodiak on Sept. 6th. \$150 of each fine was susbended and the hunting licenses of the three men were revoked for the remainder of 1960.

In Copper Center, Jack H. Pruitt of Fairbanks was fined \$750 for killing a cow moose and her two female calves on the Denali Highway.

Pruitt, who pleaded guilty to a complaint signed by Protection Officer William Sholes of Glennallen, stated that he had mistaken the mmose for caribou.

Judge Carl Eden of Copper Center ordered Pruitt's 1960 hunting license and a rifle owned by him forfeited to the State. \$300 of the fine was suspended on condition that Pruitt does not but another hunting license for a period of two years.

The moose carcasses, which were recovered, were donated to the Valdez Children's Home.

Protection assistant Jerry Crow and Game Ronald Skoog assisted Sholes in the case.

Commenting on the offense, Judge Eden said that it was the worst game violation he had ever seen

ANSWER:

To be considered a legal voter in Alaska, one must be a resident of the State for one year, and in the precent for thirty days.

Those who failed to register by voting in the August primary, or who were not eligible at that time, but will be in November will be given the opportunity to register at the time of the general election and may vote."

STATE SEARCHES FOR LAND

A swarch for land patented to the State that is suitable for agriculture took place during July and August, according to a report in the August issue of "Alaska Land Lines," a publication of the Department of Natural Resources.






