Fire Prevention Association Meeting Rescheduled

It was decided that the scholarship would be either to the Alaska Methodist University, or the University of Alaska, and that in order to be eligible for the scholarship, the person would have to be a resident of Chugiak at the time of their graduation from high school.

The goal set by the club is two hundred dollars.

The date for the bazaar has been set for Saturday, November 19th to be held at the Carnival Hall.

The bazaar will follow the lines of the one held last year, offering in addition to the usual hand made gift items, many popular features, such as a cartoon theater for the youngsters, a fortune telling booth, and this year plans are being made for BINGO games to be held throughout the day.

This year outside organizations will not be asked to participate, as there will be no opportunity for them to profit for themselves, however, anyone desiring to assist in helping to raise this fund is cordially invited to help.

The bazaar which the group held last year was to raise money for the Chugiak Public Health Fund.

NECESSARY EVIL

Community life has many ugly necessities. One of the more ugly is the public dump, which seems to spring like a mushroom whenever civilization moves in on mother nature.

In most places this is in some out of the way corner of the area where it will be as unoffensive to the public eye and nose as possible.

When the people of Chugiak first began using the Birchwood dump, it was only a small spot along the road; a road which lead only to the Birchwood Section of the Alaska Railroad, and which was traveled infrequently.

Now the Birchwood Road leads to one of the most populous sections of our community, with homes springing up almost within sight of the dump itself.

The dump has grown in proportion with the rest of the community, and now stretches for yards along the roadside and down the embankment to the creekbed.

The most objectionable feature of the dump is the failure of many of those using it to pitch their refuse over the bank, but merely dump it onto the shoulder of the road.

This progresses, as subsequent "patrons" find it harder and harder to get close to the edge, and dump their garbage closer and closer to the road proper while the debris stretches along in unsightly rows, until the road department is able to spare a piece of equipment to push the mess over the side, and then the whole process starts again.

Last week such a clean up took place and the appearance of the road past the dump was quite startling to one who had become accustomed to the unsavory appearance of the area.

It is now possible for one to drive up the edge and to empty their garbage over the side without having to wade through empty beer cans and rotting moose hides to do so.

Perhaps if we all make an effort to do just this we can keep this necessary evil from becoming the offense to the public that it has been in the past.

Still these are real bargains, with prices marked down quite drastically in some cases, or with a choice premium thrown in at the regular price.

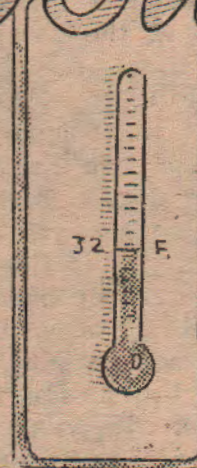

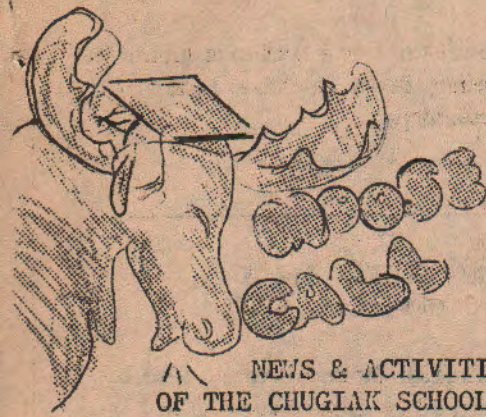

Phyllis Stewart, PTA president requests that all officers and committee chairmen plan to attend.

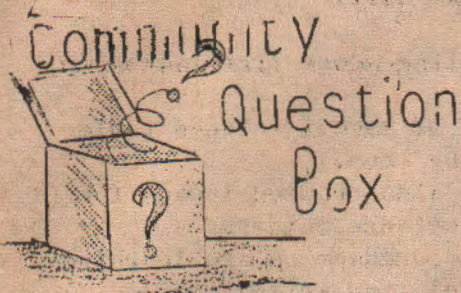

COOK FOR SEPTEMBER

ESTHER HULL

Esther offers us a tip on what to do when you are planning to serve the family leftovers, and unexpected guests drop in at dinner time.

A very festive dinner can come from the freezer to your table is no time at all and give your guests the feeling that you knew they were coming all along.

Esther calls this her "Broiler menu", since with the exception of the salad and the dessert the entire meal is prepared in one pan in the broiler at one time.

- ARRANGE on broiler pan
- 1 or more ham slices
- Canned Pineapple Rings
- Drained Canned Yams

BROIL until ham is done, turning when necessary.

SERVE with raisin Sauce, tossed salad and cookies and ice cream for dessert.

For the salad, Esther suggests this simple to make tangy

FRENCH DRESSING

- 1 can tomato soup
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2/3 cup salad oil
- 1 cup vinegar
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 tsp grated onion
- 1 tsp pepper
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp dry mustard
- 1 tsp paprika
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce

COMBINE ingredients and MIX until just blended. STORE in refrigerator.

Renaming of the club was also discussed and several more suggestions were added to the list.

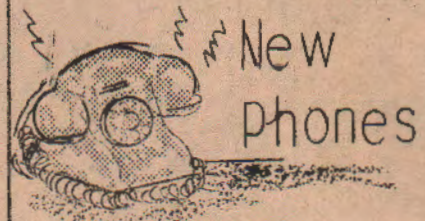
One of the members, Joan Glafke discovered her Secret Pal had brought a birthday gift for her, a boxed selection of birthday cards and a silk headscarf.

Elected to the office of President was Marta Lake, while Sandry Fetrow and Jean Baker were chosen as librarians.

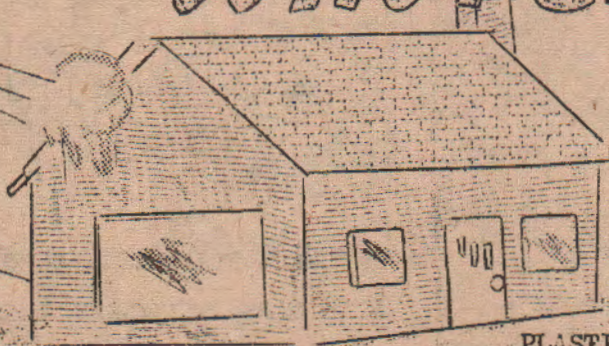

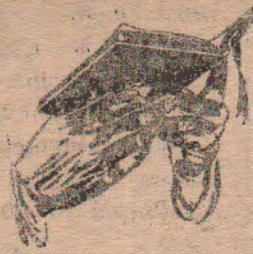

SNOW REMOVAL POLICY

The Department of Public Works has Published the following policy for snow removal.

Whenever a snow berm is created by State highway maintenance forces at the entrance to a private business or dwelling, the following policy will apply:
1. Removal of snow berm at entrances to roadside (next col)

(snow removal)

businesses or dwellings will be done after all snow removal required for general traffic on State highways is accomplished, unless it is more feasible to remove such berm along with regular operations; for example, at isolated businesses or dwellings.

2. No private driveways, service roads or parking areas or other roads which are not part of the general traveled way will be plowed unless special authority is so given or unless they are necessary for the regular snow removal operations on the highway.

3. Adequate entranceways which will permit safe access will be opened in the snow berm. Entire frontages will not be plowed.

4. Removal of the snow berms at such entranceways will be done by State forces when the berm placed by the State snow removal operations denies reasonable access to the property or causes unreasonable hardship on the property owner.

5. Strictly rural and isolated exits will be given first priority in the snow berm removal program considering the importance of the adjacent property to the safety and welfare of the traveling public.

6. Last priority will be given to exits in urban areas where normal snow removal operations are not the responsibility of the State.

In all the above operations, the exercise of good judgment is essential.
