WORK ON BRIDGE HALTS TILL SPRING

EAGLE RIVER: Motorists driving the Glenn Highway between Chugiak and Anchorage will have to spend one more winter negotiating the hazardous Eagle River Hill.

This became apparant when the Division of Highways suspended work on the bridge and road project until next spring.

According to Robert Grey, of the Dept of Highways, several problems have been encountered which made this decision necessary.

Grey said that a serious drainage problem has been encountered on the west side of

IMMEDIATE ACTION ON SCHOOL SHELTERS BEGUN

NICK BEGICH REPORTS ON EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE

CHUGIAK: N.J. (Nick) Begich, Alaskan Delegate to the FIFTY STATES EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE, held recently at Washington D.C., reported on the conference to members of the Chugiak PTA at their October meeting.

Speaking on Past and Present Interpretations of Educational Legislation, Begich touched on certain aspect of the Federal Aid to Education Bill and Public Laws controlling Federal Impact Funds.

Begich also told of some of the recommendations of recent Ford Foundation survey; calling to the attention of those present a recommendation made by the Foundation that the schools in Chugiak, Wasilla and Homer be removed from the State School System and

CHUGIAK: A committee, which grew out of the October meeting of the Chugiak PTA, has already begun immediate action toward determining a program for fallout protection for students of both the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools.

This group, meeting at the school following the regular PTA meeting, will pursue several ideas and try to determine just how much participation from the general public can be counted on.

A questionnaire is being prepared which will be circulated among the parents to learn what support can be counted on from the standpoint of talent, equipment and monetary contributions.

A group has been delegated to obtain information as to the possibility of utilizing the present primary building as a temporary shelter until weather once more permits excavation.

The building engineer will be consulted to determine if the roof of the building is strong enough to withstand the weight of lead sheathing, which would be supplemented by sandbagging of doors and windows.

It was also thought that the storage rooms, which are partially underground to begin with, might be enlarged to accomodate the storage of supplies of food and drinking water.

Mrs. Louise Long has been appointed permanent chairman of this group, and has announced that there will be another meeting at the school on Tuesday, October 17th at 7:30pm.

HOME FIRE INSPECTIONS BY BOY SCOUTS

"Be Prepared"--motto of the Boy Scouts of America--is also a good motto for fire safety in the home.

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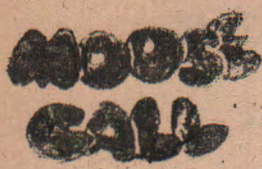

TEXAN FINDS 1961 FISH TAG IN CAN OF SALMON

TEXAS: A Texan, opening a can of 1961 Alaskan salmon in faraway Texas, and finding a salmon tag may have inadvertently assisted the Alaska Department of Fish and Game in another aspect of biological research.

Salmon are tagged by the Department, among other things to determine fishing intensity in certain areas. This intensity is estimated by the number of tagged fish that are caught from a particular tagging operation.

The Texan returned the tag, number C-1202, to the fish company whose label was on the can.

Evidently, this Texan did not own an oil well, for he requested the \$1 reward for returning the tag. The company forwarded the tag to the Fish and Game Department at Juneau, requesting that the tag be traced.

John Vania, Fishery Biologist of the Commercial Fisheries Division, who conducted the Department's 1961 South-eastern Alaskan tagging operations with two crews, consulted the records. It showed that this salmon, which was a pink, was tagged and released in the Inian Islands, Icy Strait, at 6 a.m. July 12th, 1961.

From this date on, the salmon's life was particularly eventful. Within two months, the fish was caught, canned, labeled, wholesaled and then retailed by a food store in Texas to the Texan who found the tag.

Ninety-eight percent of these tags are detected before the fish even reaches the cannery, Vania explained.

They are handled individually several times, pitched from seiner to buyer and observed on the canning line at the cannery before being canned.

Vania believes the reason this tag escaped unnoticed was partly because it was white.

The yellow and red ones are easier to spot.

The tag was a plastic disk

type with a 5/8 inch diameter. It is attached to the fish with a nickel-plated pin placed through the salmon's back just below the dorsal fin.

The Department sent the Texan his dollar.
