HIGH SCHOOL BUSES DELAYED BY SNOWFALL

It was approximately eleven thirty before the buses reached the terminal point on their route.

ONLY THE BEGINNING

One of the strongest arguments in favor of building a High School in Chugiak was emphasized last Friday when two of the high school buses were stalled for three hours at the top of traffic snarled Eagle River Hill.

The first snowfall of any size this year brought that stretch of road to it's usual winter state of cars crosswise, in the ditch and accompanying melee of smashed fenders etc.

The bus drivers did not dare begin the dangerous descent until the sanding trucks arrived, and State Police were able to clear the highway.

The OCHS committee derives little satisfaction from being able to say "I told you so", when the price of that privilege is anxiety on the part of the parents, and the hardship suffered by the students some of whom didn't arrive home until almost midnight; cold, hungry, and suffering from other physical discomforts incurred in the long hours seated in the stalled buses.

The unfortunate part is that is only the beginning. Winter is not even officially upon us, and from past experience we can look forward to much more of this kind of weather, some a good deal worse.

This time we were fortunate; the bus drivers were able to evaluate the situation and the only results were hardship, anxiety and physical discomfort.

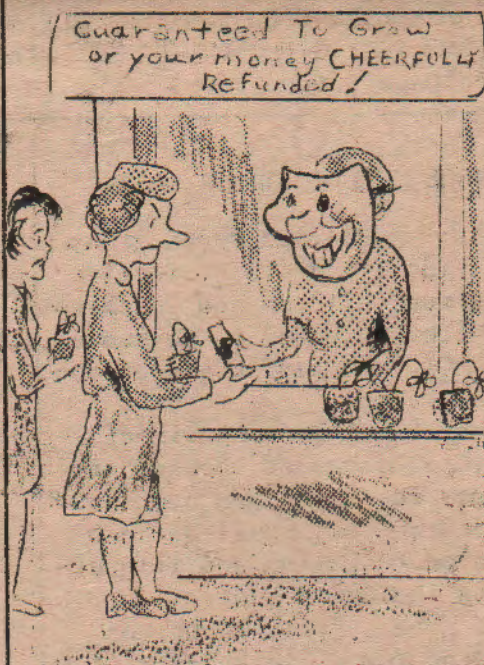
But for how long can we count on being so lucky? Every time those buses traverse that particular (next col)

section of road, the odds of something more ominous happening are increased.

We are all aware of the grim significance of that group of crosses on the Eagle River Hill, and we do not want any tragedy involving our children to increase their number.

Whatever the arguments may be on the cost of building a High School in this area may be, what will be the cost of not building one?

Winners of the Fire Prevention Poster Contest were selected and prizes awarded at assemblies on Friday, October 13th.

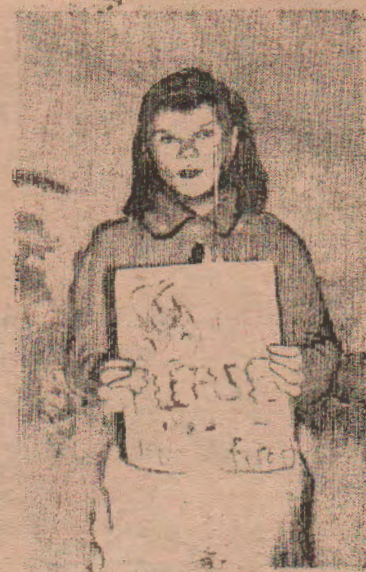

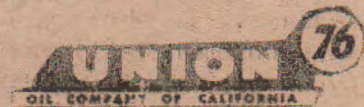

A public opinion poll devoted to subjects of current community interest.

The following question was asked at random to members of the Chugiak Parent Teachers Association.

QUESTION: Do you feel that with the opening of the new Eagle River School, that a separate PTA should be formed?

If so, do you feel that the present organization should continue until the regular spring elections, or should the new organization be formed at once?

BILLIE MOORE, EAGLE RIVER:

"...At first thought it might seem more convenient to have two separate PTAs however, as long as the State regards both schools in this area as one, I think it would be best to have one set of officers and elect committees from both schools.

Also, since the dividing line between the schools is flexible, officers elected in the spring might discover that the line had been moved in the fall, and that they were living in the wrong district from the one they had been elected to represent."

LIZ HARRIMAN BIRCHWOOD:

"...I would hate to see the community divided, especially since there will still be so many interests and responsibilities to be shared by both schools, such as the hot lunch program.

Perhaps a system could be devised whereby a joint council could work on the common interests, while the individual problems of each school could be handled by local committees."



HAZEL ARNDT EAGLE RIVER:

"...I feel that every school should have its own PTA. However, in view of the fact that in this

community the PTA is the only common meeting place and serves as an informal local government, so to speak, I think an effort should be made to keep the organizations working together.

Perhaps holding meetings at either school alternately or holding joint meetings every two months, should two separate organizations be formed."

In any event, I think we should continue with our present set-up until the regular election time next spring.



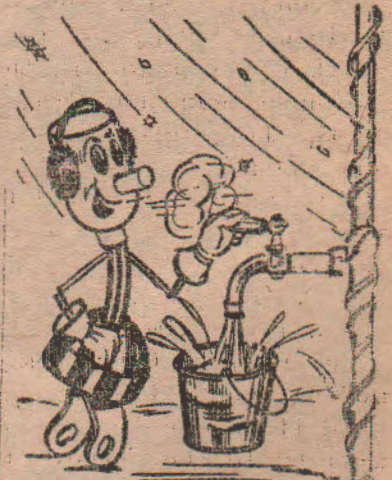
BILL LOWE PETERS CREEK:

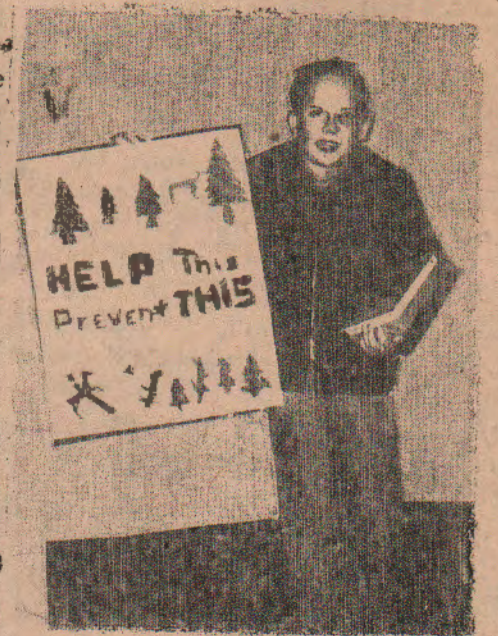

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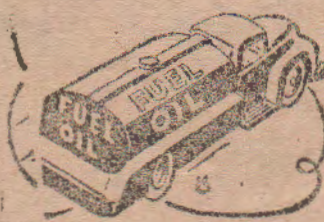
