#### PLAN TO SURVIVE TOMORROW

While most of us are have still to begin being concerned over the possibility of a nuclear attact, some of our residents have been quietly but determinedly preparing a fallout shelter for their families.

It is the intent of the COURIER to persuade these people who plan to survive tomorrow to tell their story to our readers, in hopes that seeing how real people whom they know, and who face problems similar to their own have gone about protecting their families will inspire the rest of us to take positive action on our own.

#### CIVIL DEFENSE MEETING CONVINCED US

The civil defense meeting which we attended last month convinced us that is was wise to be prepared in case of emergency.

For \$750. we have built a basement type shelter which is built to protect from fall-out and to witchstand a certain amount of impact. (No civilian shelter will stand up against a direct or nearby blast)

We hired a good part of the work done, as it was necessary to beat the freezing weather.

A loader dug a large hole u under the couse. We poured a cement floor on this and extended the floor out from the house, making about a nine by six foot high additior I underground storage.

is addition was formed up i h concrete walls and an eight inch concrete centing, reinforced with steel rods, which (next col)

'as then covered with eighteen nches of dirt.

The main room, about ten by en, was lined with cement lock and an eight inch conrete ceiling will be poured.

A spring was hit under the nouse when the hole was dug, and this presented some difficulties; but when properly corralled, will give us an uncontaminated water supply in case of emergency.

For example trousers which are placed in the machine with a crease will come out still neatly creased, but minus whatever dirt they may have been stained with.

For clothing with stubborn stains or spots, a small bottle so spot conditioner may be purchased from a dispensor for only a quarter which is applied to the spot before tossing it into the machine. This will last for many cleanings.

Those of us with home laundrys may have felt that we
would nave no need to use the
lovely clean ultra-modern laundry facilities which are available at the Eagle River Lanudry Center, but with the installation of these new dry-clearers, we predict that this will
soon be the palce at which
one can sooner or later expect to see every resident
of this entire community.

At this time Montal Ability Tests are being given to students in grades one, four and seven. The results of these tests help determine the grade level of the individual child.


SCHOOL PHOTOS


Tell me, who is right? ...Daisy Mae



POOR WIRING CAN MEAN HIGHER ELECTRIC BILLS If you think your electric bills are too high, you might find the reason in your wiring. Perhaps you are trying to run a 1954 line-up of electrical equipment on a 1944 wiring system.


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
