State Checks Traffic On Side Roads

CHUGIAK: A Statewide program to collect traffic data on all existent roads and streets in Alaska has extended even to some of the side access roads in the Chugiak area.

In addition to the traffic counters which had been placed at intervals along the Glenn Highway, some of the more traveled side roads were checked for twenty four hour periods.

All students from grades 1 through eight are eligible to enter.

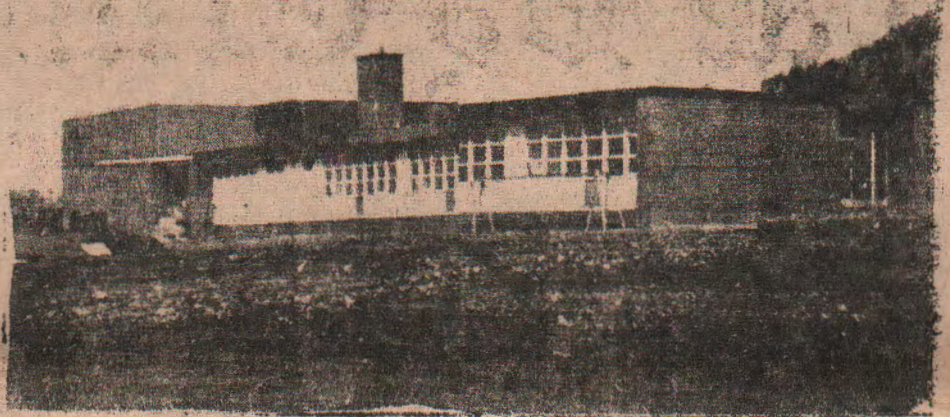
Names will be turned in to the individual room teachers, with the deadling for entering October 18th.

ALASKA APPLE BUTTER

SOAK together for 1 hour
1# dried apples
2 qts warm water

ADD 2 qts cranberries
COOK until soft
PUT pulp through food saver
REHEAT and add
¾ as much sugar
1 tsp cinnamon
¼ tsp salt
½ tsp. cloves
COOK until clear.
ADD juice of 1 lemon
PACK in jars and seal.

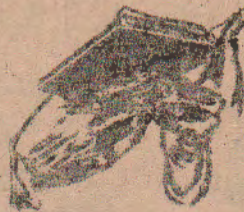

Brownies of Troop #56 elected officers for three months at their first meeting of the fall session.

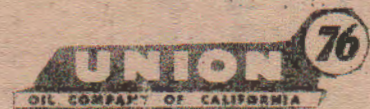
