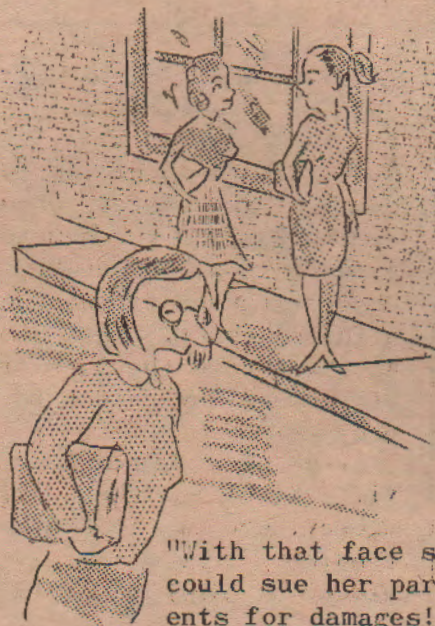

They Bobbed for apples ate pumpkin cookies and drank mugs of "witches brew".

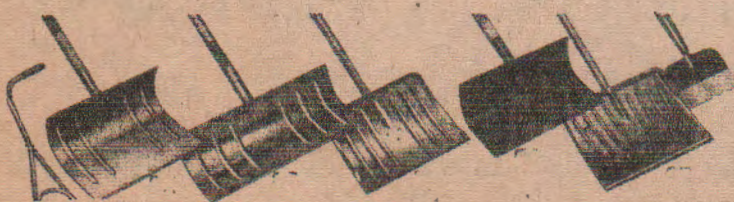
SNOW QUEEN TO SHOW TWO NIGHTS

of Commerce.

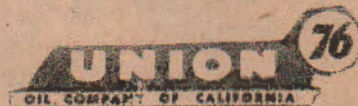
In making application for

Mrs. Davis said that the hymnal, which had been passed down in her family on her father's side appeared to be over 200 years old.

The flyleaf and cover of the book are missing, but it appears to be printed in early American English.

Mr. Murray North, Head of the Music Department of the University, said that the volume will be used for research and for the observation of the department.

The Alaska Methodist University welcomes item of this nature for research and it is felt that there are many such artifacts in the Anchorage area which may be donated or loaned to the various departments of the University.

LIVING MUSEUM

SKAGWAY: You might wonder why Skagway Alaska, ever thought it needed a museum.

The town itself amounts almost to a living, exciting pictorial of Alaska history.

Old false-fronted buildings constructed during the rearing gold rush days retain their frontier atmosphere.

Residents put on a "Days of '98" show three or four nights weekly in the summer, taking visitors back to the last century. And a ride on the narrow gauge railroad connecting Skagway with Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, Canada transports (next col.)

(Skagway)

travelers in the 20th Century comfort beside the man-killing but fabulously scenic Chilkoot Trail to the gold fields

But Skagway wanted a museum and Skagway produced one, and it's fast developing into one of the most interesting local museums in the Northwest.

The collection includes a full-sized indian war canoe, a Samovar dating back to the Czarist Russian occupation of Alaska; Chilkat Indian blankets, robes and regalia, Native baskets from all over Alaska; a robe entirely of duck feathers, an Eskimo sled, a "one horse open sleigh," paintings, frontier mining supplies and scores of other items of Alaskan.

The museum building --first granite structure in Alaska-- is of considerable interest itself. Originally opened in 1899 as a Methodist College, the building later became U.S. District Court of Alaska, Number one. Many old courtroom furnishings remain intact, including the judges bench and jury chairs. Old court records--some tragic, some humorous, some relating to millionaires others to paupers--have been preserved and may be viewed under glass.

A visit to Skagway is worthwhile to both tourist and Alaskan.

DEMOCRAT TO HOLD PRECINCT MEETING

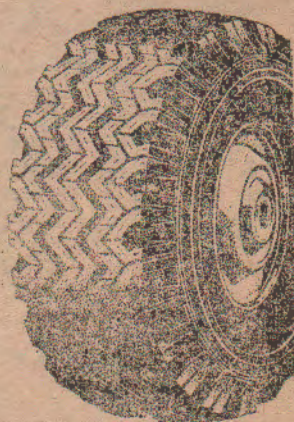

2 7/8 cups sifted flour
1½ tsp soda
1½ tsp salt
¾ tsp cinnamon
½ tsp cloves
½ tsp allspice
½ cup water
½ cup chopped walnuts
½ cup seeded raisins (cut up)
¼ cup cut dates
¼ cup candied cherries
¼ cup candied pineapple
¼ cup lemon peel

CREAM shortening and sugar until fluffy
BEAT in egg
ADD applesauce
SIFT dry ingredients together
STIR alternately with water
AT LAST mix in fruit

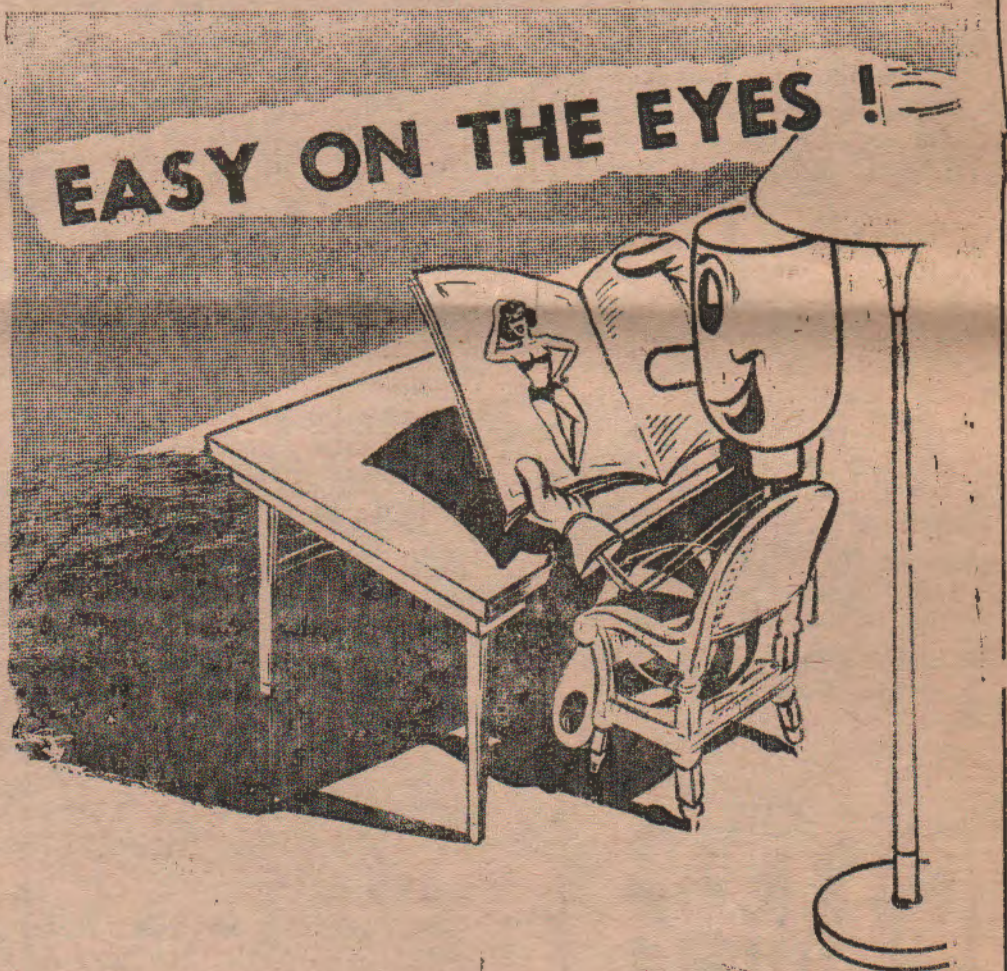

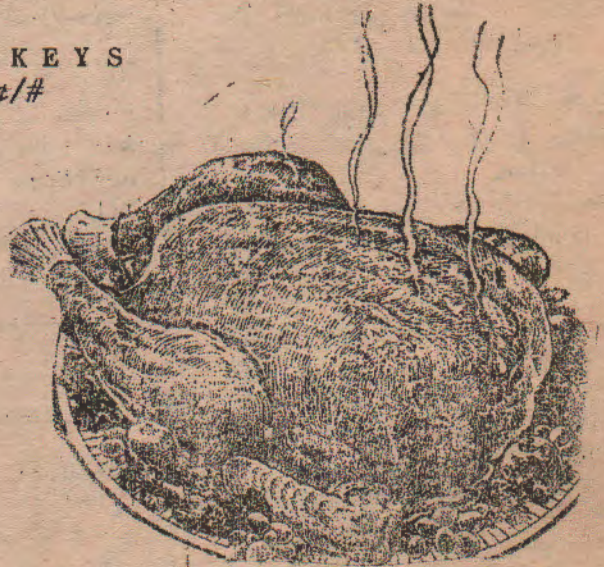

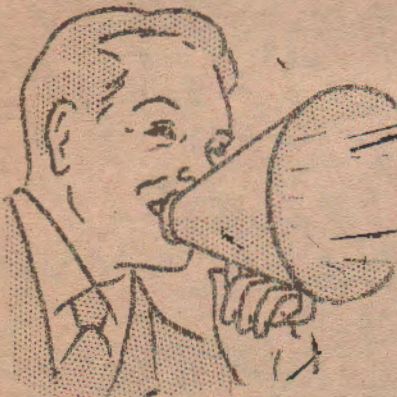
