LIVING MUSEUM

SKAGWAY: You might wonder why Skagway Alaska, ever thought it needed a museum.

The town itself ammounts almost to a living, exciting pictorial of Alaska history.

Old false-fronted buildings constructed during the rei-roaring gold rush days retain their frontier atmosphere.

Residents put on a "Days of '98" show three or four nights weekly in the summer, taking visitors back to the last century. And a ride on the narry w guage railroad connecting agway with Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, Canada transports

travelers in the 20th Century confort beside the man-killing but fabulously scenic Chilkoot Trail to the gold fields

But Skagway wanted a musteum and Skagway produced one, and it's fast developing into one of the most interesting local museums in the Northwest.

The collection includes a full-sized indian war cance, a Samovar dating bact to the Czarist Russian occupation of Alaska; Chilkat Indian blankets, robes and regalia, Native baskets from all over Alaska; a robe entirely of duck feathers, an Eskimo sled, a "one horse open sleigh," paintings, frontier mining supplies and scores of other items of Alaskana.

The museum ibuilding --first granite structure in Alaska-is of considerable interest itself. Originally opened in 1899 as a Lethodist College, the building later became U.S. District Court of Alaska, Number one. Lany old courtroom furnishings remain intact, including the judges bench and jury chairs. Old court records--some tragic, some humorour, some relating to millionaires others to paupers--have be been preserved and may be viewed under glass.






