

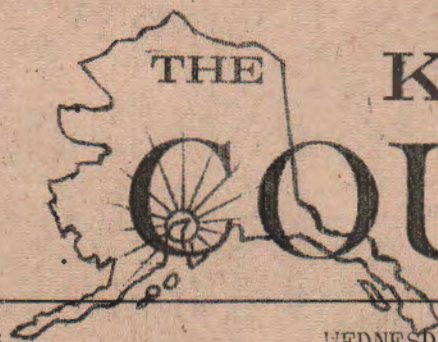

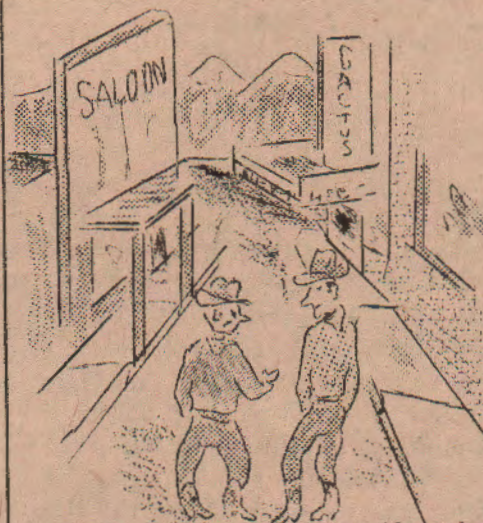

COOK FOR NOVEMBER
URSULA BEAM

Holiday season is synonymous with cookie baking, and this week Ursula offers a cookie which combines two old favorites in a delicious drop cookie.

CHOCOLATE-CHIP OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 cup shortening (butter or oleo)
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 3/4 cup white sugar
- 2 unbeaten eggs
- 1 tsp soda
- 1 Tbs. hot water
- 1 cup nutmeats
- 2 8oz. pkgs chocolate chips
- 2 cups oatmeal
- 1 tsp vanilla

CREAM butter until soft
 ADD sugar gradually
 BEAT well
 ADD eggs 1 at time beating well after each
 DISSOLVE soda in water
 ADD alternately with dry ingredients beating well
 FOLD in remaining ingredients
 DROP by spoonful on greased cookie sheet
 BAKE at 375° for 10 minutes.

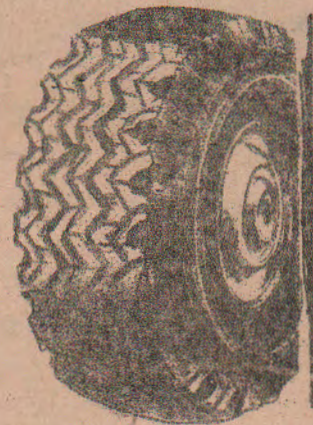

They said that other members of the family had traveled considerable distance to attend the funeral and that I had failed my brother in his hour of need.

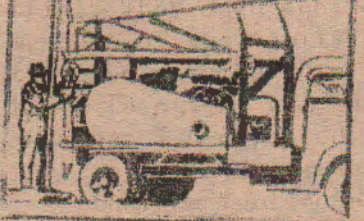

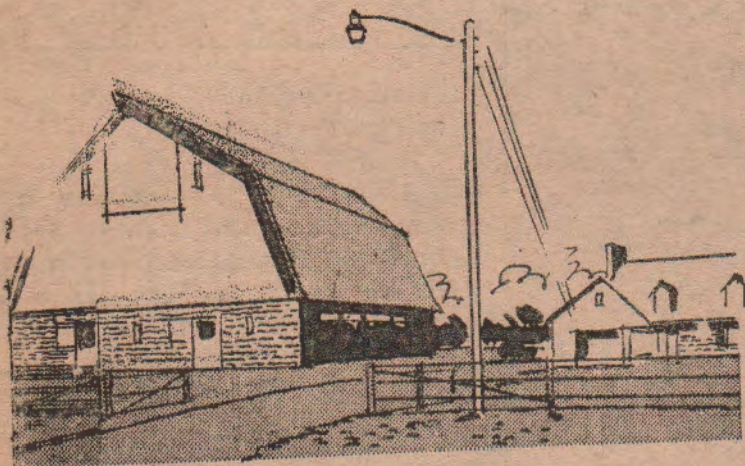

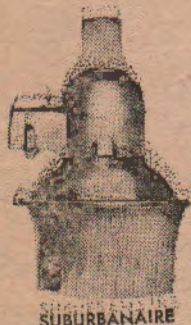

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

QUESTION:

My husband died three years ago. I will become 62 years of age next month and would like to know if I should file my application for benefits or should I wait until I am 65?

ANSWER:

You may file your application as much as three months before you reach 62. We suggest you file your application at the earliest opportunity, as there is no reduction in a widow's benefit if she files at 62.

You will need proof of your marriage and your husband's social security number when you call at our office.

If you have a social security number of your own, be sure to bring your card with you.
