BIRCHMOOD: A second dog, this time a fifteen year old shepherd named Pal, has been shot to death on Jayhawk Drive in Birchwood.

Pal was the family pet of Dorothy M. Green, who had just recently moved to the community.

Mrs. Green stated that she had let the old dog out fifteen minutes before she discovered his body lieing beside their mailbox. She said that she had not heard any shot.

Earlier this month a collie belonging to John Steeby also of Jayhawk Drive was also found shot.

State Police are questioning several suspects in connection with both shootings.

CHUGIAK: Incorporation of Chugiak was the recommendation of the Alaska State School Board. This recommendation was made known to Dale Pierson, Co-chairman of Operation Chugiak High School in a letter from Theo J. Norby, State Commissioner of Education.

Pierson had recently met with the school board in Juneau to present the needs for a high school in this community.

The following letter from Norby dated November 17th stated the conclusions reached by the board.

Dear Mr. Pierson:

The members of the State
Board of Education appreciated
the opportunity to consult with
you regarding the school housing needs in the Chugiak area,
particularly as they relate to
a high school.

The need is quite evident, and the State Board of Education has requested the Commissioner to submit a report on the overall construction needs in the State to be considered by the Board for presentation to the Division of Planning, Office of the Governer.

The inventory is practically complete and we are now projecting enrollments and making some estimates for future needs.

Nore physical facilities for both elementary and high school students are needed in the Chugiak area. The Board believes that Chugiak citizens should explore the possibility of incorporation, which would lead (cont page 7 col 3)

"UESTION: I have heard that men can now retire at 62, but that their social security benefits will be "permanently reduced." How much is this reduction?

ANSWER: The exact reduction depends on how many months the man is under 65 when he first takes his benefits.

The maximum reduction is 20 percent, made when benefits start with the month a man reaches 62.

This means that is you would be eligible for a monthly benefit of \$80 at 65, you would receive \$64 a month at 62.

When benefits start later, but before the man reaches 65, reductions are less: about 14 percent at 63, and 7 percent at 64.

In the future the movies will be held alternately at the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools.





We depost of us recognize the tremendous uplift electricity has given the working and living conditions of the farmer and his wife, we often forget that rural electrification has also had a gigantic impact on other walks of life, too.


