

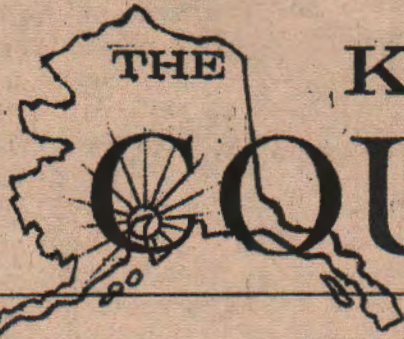

NORTH TO ALASKA

We are reading much now of the tragic victims of false and misleading advertising in stateside newspapers which brings to Alaska entire families looking for jobs and free land which does not exist.

Chugiak sees more than it's share of these people, due to the number of public campgrounds and open country in the area where these individuals park their trailers and tents while they attempt to find work so that they might earn enough money that they might return home.

With the coming of winter, real hardship besets these folks, most of them with large families of small children. By this time their stock of money and food is exhausted, their stateside clothing and tents and trailers inadequate for Alaskan winters.

Of course, since these people have not resided in Alaska for a year, they are not eligible for State Welfare, so it falls back on the Churches and other social organizations of the community to keep these families from starving and freezing.

In most cases, these organizations are glad and able to do this, but it does not alter the fact that these people have been lured here and forced to become objects of charity by unscrupulous elements who could not have much to gain by this action.

The people of Chugiak will continue to help these victims whenever a case is brought to their attention, but they cannot help but join with our Governor in urging that something be done to

The Cook of the Month

COOK FOR NOVEMBER
URSULA BEAM

For her second recipe, Ursula gives us a dish with an Oriental Flavor, which uses our plentiful Alaskan moose or Caribou.

PEPPER STEAK

- CUT 2 pounds of chuck roast into thin strips (about 2" by 1" long)
- BROWN meat in 3tbs. shortening
- ADD two cups water and 2 beef bouillon cubes.
- BRING TO boil
- COVER and simmer about 1 hour or until meat is tender
- ADD 2 each red and green peppers cut into eighths.
- SIMMER 5 minutes longer
- BLEND 3 tbs cornstarch with 2 tbs soy sauce
- ADD 1 cup water and blend
- ADD to meat mixture
- COOK stirring slowly until thickened
- SERVE with fluffy cooked rice and additional soy sauce (if desired)

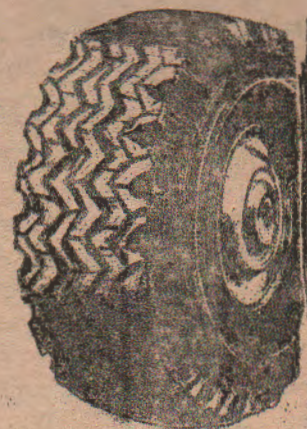

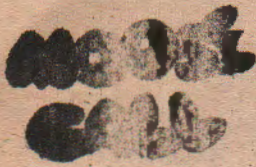


The group consists of eight figures; Mary with her arms encircling baby Jesus in the manger, Joseph, the three wise men, a shepherd and two animals.

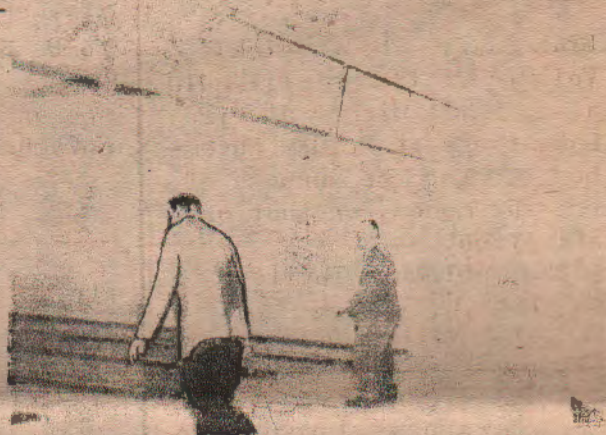

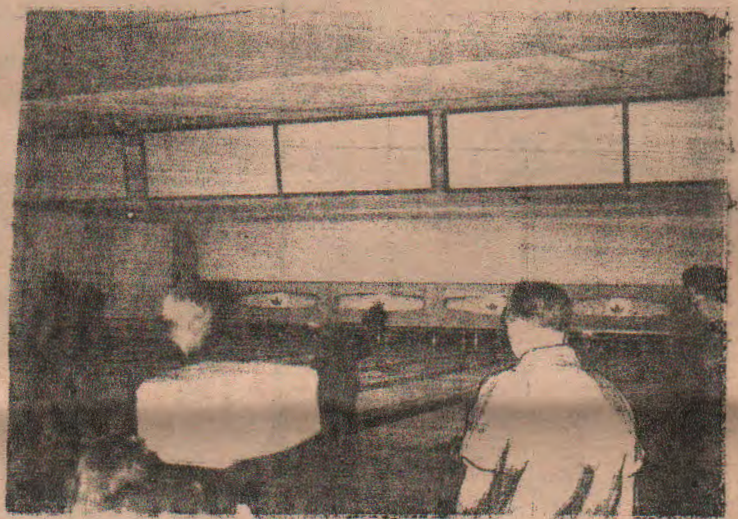
