One site will be used to build a substation, warehouse and pole storage area, the other for a headquarters building.


The latter site is located near the Eagle River Shopping Center.


Mrs. Long had asked not to be nominated, as she felt that after two years of serving as President, some one else should be given that opportunity.







# COOK FOR DECEMBER FERNE JOHNSTON

With three small boys to cook for, most of Fernels recipies are aimed with a sweet tooth in mind.

Here is quick fudge recipe that is always popular.

#### FIVE MINUTE FUDGE

MIX TOGETHER: 2/3 cup (small can) undiluted evaporated milk 1 2/3 cup sugar 1 tsp salt PLACE in saucepan over medium heat BRING to boil COOK five minutes (stirring constantly) begin timing when mixture starts to "bubble" around edges of pan) REMOVE from heat ADD : 1½ cups ( about 16 medium) diced marshmallows. 1½ semi-sweet chocolate pieces (11/2 6 oz. pkgs.) 1 tsp vanilla STIR vigorously for 1 minute POUR into 8 inch square buttered pan. GARNISH with nuts if desired COOL and cut into squares. RAISINS or chopped nuts may be added when heating marshmallows if desired.



# CHUGIAK LIBRARY RANKS NINTH IN STATE

BOOK REPORT: (An activity report on the Chugiak Public Library)

Last Thursday, your library resumed it's role as the Chugiak School Library, opening at 9am to accomodate classes from 4<sup>th</sup> thru 8<sup>th</sup> grades. (next col.)

#### (Library)

As your child may have informed you, library cards cost \$1.00 per year per family and allow four books to be taken out at one time.

Adults are also welcome from 9:30 to 3:30 on Thursdays, providing they are prepared to accept a little more jostling and exhuberance than is generally, found in a library.

Of special interest to this community is the annual report on all libraries in the State. Each library is catalogued as to number of hours open per week, circulation etc.

Of the twenty nine libraries in the state, ranging from the Lousanc library in Anchorage to the library in Pelican-- hum giak library ranked 9th in circulation, behind such libraries as Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau and Ketechikan, but ranking ahead of even Palmer and Sitka.

Also, in as much as children are responsible for over 90% of total circulation, we in this community can be assured that we evidently have the readingest kids in the state.

Further along the survey, however, we come to a special disadvantage of this library,-though we rank 9<sup>th</sup> in circulation, we rank 25<sup>th</sup> in number of volumes available and 25<sup>th</sup> in revenue.

If you can follow statistics, along further, figuring that 90% is children, and that only 25% of our books are children's books, you can see a marked deficiency in this area.

# QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

#### QUESTION:

I have not worked for 11 months because I cannot find a job. I am 51 years old. Can I freeze my record during this unemployment period?

# ANSWER::

No; there is no provision in the Pocial Security Law which will enable you to freeze your record because you are unable to find a job.

The only time that a nonwork period can be disregarded is when you are determined to be totally disabled under the social security provisions

It should be remembered that is is permissable to dropout five of your lowest or non-earning years when your benefit amount is figured.

### OUTSIDE PAPERS STILL FALSIFY ALASKAN JOB OPPORTUNITIES

JUNEAU: <sup>G</sup>overnor William A. Egan said today he has renewed his request with Attorney General David D. Farman of New Jersey for action to halt the continued publication of advertisements misrepresenting employment opportunities and salaries purportedly available in Alaska.

The Governor based his request on assurances previously received from Furman that the advertiser, a Newark, New Jersey firm, "has agreed not to place any more advertisements on Alaska employment opportunities and to cancel advertisements which he had already contracted for."

Despite this assurance, received in mid-October, Egan said the questionable advertisements were carried in one New York City newspaper on October, §2nd and in at (next col.

least one other on November 12<sup>th</sup>. Advertisements holding forth the lure of fantstically high *s* salaries in Alaska also were published in the November issues of several national magazines and in the December issue of one publication.

"I have also had reports from both within and without Alaska," Egan said, "as to the recent use of similar advertisements over a radio station in .aterloo Iowa, although my information does not indicate whether **the** origin of these is the same or different from that of the published advertisements."

In letters to the Attorneys General of New Jersey and New York some weeks ago, Governor Egan asked that action be taken to halp publication of the advertisements, noting several instances where families had been lured to Alaska by the promies of high-paying jobs, only to be left stranded and required to appeal to welfare organizations for assistance when work was not available.

Similar letters, seeking cooperation to stop such advertising, also have been written to newspapers, magazines and radio stations whose use of the advertisements have been called to the Governor's attention by other concerned Alaskans.


