YOU WILL NOT SEE IT HERE AGAIN

The manager of Fawcett Shopping Sections, advertising department for the national publications of Fawcett Publications Inc., has replied to Gov. Wm. A Egan's protests against misleading Alaska employment advertisments with yhe flat assertion:

"YOU WILL NOT SEE IT HERE AGAIN."

The assurance came from Mgr. Joseph Sheldon to whom Gov. Egan had written after the nisleading advertising appeared in the November issue of TURE MAGAZINE and again when a similar advertisement appoared in the December issue of CAVALIER, also a Fawcett Publication.

Sheldon advised the Governor, that after appearance of the advertisement in TRUE he had sent a memorandum to the company's Censorship Dept. "telling them that this advertisement was undesirable for Fawcett Publications -- not TRUE alone."

He explained subsequent appearance of the advertisement in CAVALIER by saying the publication has a closing date for advertising two months in advance of the publication and was unable to cancel the advertisement when it received the memorandum. For the same reason, he said, the advertisement will also appear in the January Cavalier, for which the closing date was October 1st.

Egan said he also received a similar letter from CAVAL-IER's advertising manage., John H. Hickerson, stating that "you may rest assured that this ad or similar ones will not appear again in CAV-A IER."

The Governor's letter to the Fawcett publications were among a number le has written (next col.)

(advertising)

to national publications and newspapers in which the advertisments have appeared, calling attention to instances where persons responding to the advertisements have been induced to come to Alaska and have been left stranded when assured employment failed to materalize.

He also has written to the Attorneys General of New York and New Jersey seeking their assmistance in halting future such advertisements.




Dear Martha, I do wish you would set me straight on the customs



Egan, however, has contended that if the United States initiate such service, Canada would follow suit.

Early last month, the U.S. Bureau of Customs said it would put 24-hour service into effect at Tok hext summer. In Washington today, Senator E. L: Bartlett said he had been advised by Commissioner of Customs Philip Nichols Jr. that the Canadian Customs and L. and excise Administration has agreed to establish round-theclock service at Snag Creek each summer from May 1 to September 30th each year, begining in 1962.






