BIRCHWOOD: State Police were summoned after a juvenile in the Birchwood area had threatened several other juveniles with a 45 caliber automatic.

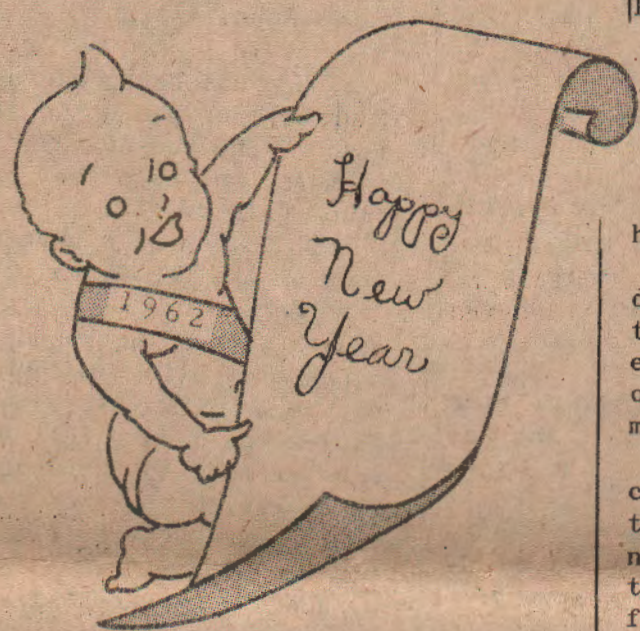
The police investigated the matter and then turned it over to the juvenile authorities.

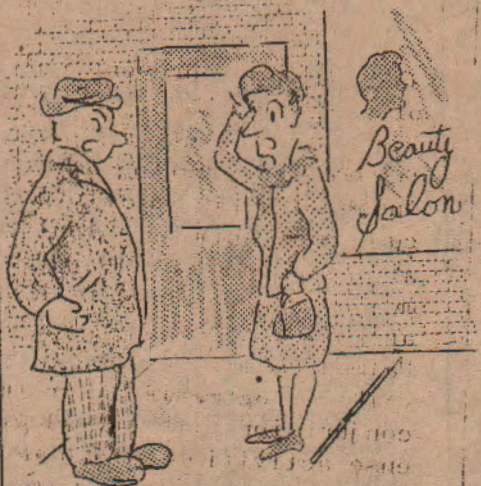

COOK OF THE MONTH

For her final Recipe, Ferne gives us an unusual cookie, which requires no baking.

NO-BAKE PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

2 1/2 cups oatmeal (quick cooking)

1/2 cup peanut butter

1 TBS vanilla

PLACE in large bowl or pan

BLEND Well, and set aside

COMBINE:

2 cups sugar

1/2 cup milk

4 tbs cocoa

Dash of salt

PLACE in pan over medium heat

BRING to boil

CONTINUE boiling for one minute

REMOVE from stove

POUR over peanut butter mixture

MIX together thoroughly

DROP by spoonfuls on waxed paper.

ALLOW to set for 10 minutes.

VARIATIONS: add raisins, or nuts or cocoanut to peanutbutter mixture.

Also can be spread on buttered cookie sheet and cut into bars when cool.

ESKIMO MUSIC TO BE  
FEATURED AT FESTIVAL

ANCHORAGE: Alaska's intriguing and little-known Eskimo music featured for the first time in the 1961 Alaska Festival of Music, is assured of recognition as an important element in Alaska's cultural heritage.

The long-neglected Eskimo art form was introduced to Alaskans and Alaska visitors last summer at the Alaska Festival of Music by Lorraine Koranda, authority on Eskimo folk music.

As a consequence of Mrs. Koranda's efforts and the full support of the Festival of Music, a \$17,000 grant by the Z.J. Loussac Foundation of Anchorage will enable her to devote full time to research and documentation of Eskimo songs and music.

Following participation in a Festival folk music seminar on June 15, which will also feature John Jacob Niles and Lowell Thomas Jr., Mrs. Koranda will be presented the grant by Z.J. Loussac, retired druggist and chairman of the Loussac Foundation.

Mrs. Koranda will leave for the Arctic on June 16 for a continuation of her work. She will be assisted by the University of Alaska and Anchorage Community College, as well as the Alaska Festival of Music.

In addition to giving Alaska's native music a larger role, the seventh annual Alaska Festival of Music--this year scheduled for June 11-28--will include Alaska's first electronics music concert on June 21, featuring work on Vladimir Ussachevsky, who will be present.

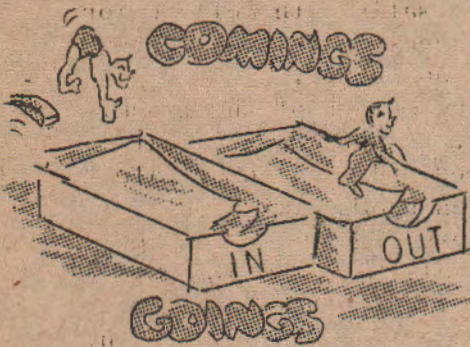

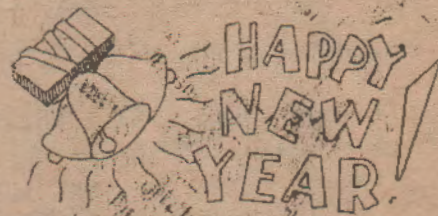

A highlight of the scrimmage was when Lester Stephens made 8 points to tie the game 8-8. After that, the Rams picked up 10 points to win the game 18-12.

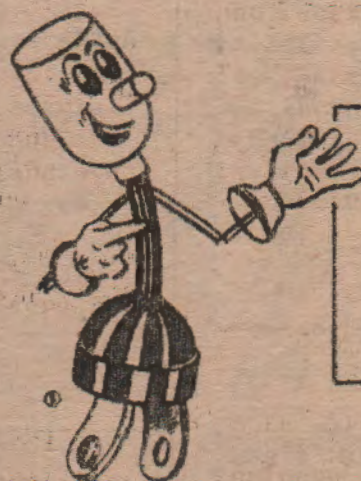
Our first public game will be January 3, 1962. The admission will be 25¢ for all students and 75¢ for adults.

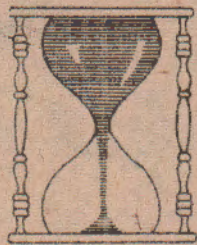

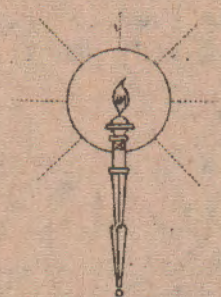

There is to be a special party on December 31st (New Years Eve) beginning at 8pm and lasting until 1pm.


