#### STRAY BULLET KILLS HORSE

Nipper, a part Arabian part Paramino horse belonging to John Vanover, of Eagle River was shot and killed last week by some unknown person.

The animalidied after several days of sickness and an muttapey by Dr. Barnes of the Spenard Vetenary Clinic dise-closed that a 22 cal. bullet had entered the animals : chest cavity, causing death.

Dulie says that despite all of the wonderful cake mixes that are available ow, when she wants a good old fashioned spice cake nothing can match this favorite recipe.

#### OLD FASHIONED SPICE CAKE

2 cups flour

2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp salt

11 tsp nutmeg

% tsp. cloves

1/4 tsp. allspice

½ cup raisins

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup shortening

1 cup mile

SIFT flour

ADD dry ingredients

DD raisins

CREAM shortening w/2 tbs milk

and dry ingredients, alternating with remaining milk POUR into loaf pan

BAKE 30-40 min, at 350° SERVE with whipped cream.

#### COLLEGE COURSE AVAILABLE.


The possibility of a second community college course in Chugiak has been offered if sufficient interest is shown.






