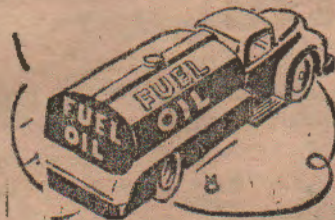

Eulie says that despite all of the wonderful cake mixes that are available now, when she wants a good old fashioned spice cake nothing can match this favorite recipe.

OLD FASHIONED SPICE CAKE

- 2 cups flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp. cloves
- 1/4 tsp. allspice
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg

GIFT flour

ADD dry ingredients
ADD raisins

CREAM shortening w/2 tbs milk

MIX

ADD dry ingredients, alternating with remaining milk

POUR into loaf pan

BAKE 30-40 min, at 350°

SERVE with whipped cream.

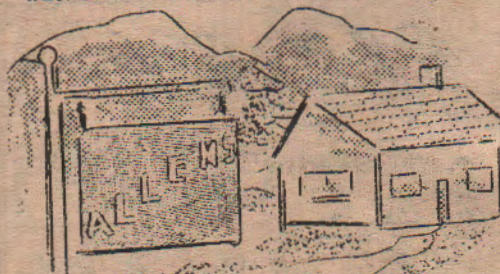
