ACCIDENTS.


A number of accidents in the

FIRST consideration of ALL
fireman. The first fireman at
the scene of a mishap always
surveys the situation to det-

be any danger and this extends
to human or animal and either




SCOUT TROOP #6 REPORTING



SOFT GINGER COOKIES

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 3/4 cup light molasses
- 1 cup THICK sour milk
- 1 egg (beaten)
- 1 tsp soda
- 1/2 tsp ginger
- 1 1/2 tsp cinnamon
- 3 1/2 cups sifted flour

CREAM sugar & shortening
 ADD soda to sour milk
 MIX milk, egg and molasses with sugar-shortening
 ADD dry ingredients
 MIX thoroughly
 DROP by tsp. on greased cookie sheet
 FLATTEN slightly w/spoon
 PLACE 4 seedless raisins on top
 BAKE at 400° until browned
 SPRINKLE with powdered or granulated sugar while hot.
 COOL and store in covered jar to keep soft and moist.

 place of safety, or make the situation as safe as possible. The Chugiak Vol. Firemen who went out and sanded the icy Eagle River hill were following this principal. They figured that a few hours of their time spent voluntarily, might save the lives of some local family returning home. Their time lost can be made up, but someone's life lost can never be recovered.

The Chugiak Vol. Fire Co. doesn't set boundaries to best serve the people. We set our boundaries because we were required to do so by State Law. We therefore set them as large as possible to cover as much as possible with all we have at our command. Our boys would gladly tackle the gate of Hell with the obsolete equipment we have patched up & made usable, if we thought that a life might be saved.

This talk of a school at Eagle River and how wonderful it is to have a Fire Dept also. The community of Chugiak has always had a school and the children of Eagle River have always attended it. It has had serious water problems, fire hazard problems, safety problems, unsafe transportation problems and only a few people were concerned with the welfare of the children. Is the Eagle River Improvement Assoc. saying that the lives of the children of other parts of Chugiak are less important than the lives of the Eagle River Children? Are the people who have so conveniently stayed in their shell before the Eagle River school is build going to come out and "take care of only their own?" Are they going to spread their feathers and crow and take all






