## Boy Breaks Leg In Sledding Accident

Six year old Frankie Rosenberg son of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Rosenberg of mile 22, was injured while sledding with playmates last Friday afternoon and now hospitalized with a broken leg.

The boy received emergency treatment by Dr. Marshal Simpson who had been summoned and was then transferred to the ANS Hospital in Anchorage.

The break is a serious fracture of the thigh bone, and may require hospitalization of several months.

The Rosenbergs have two other children and are expecting their fourth child later this month.

## Six Radios Serve Fire Company

These sets will insure rapid transmission of information of all fire and emergency calls.

### PHONE OUTAGES AFFECT ALL OF CHUGIAK

For the past several days the entire community of Chugiak has been experiencing periodic phone outages which appears to affect the whole Homestead exchange at once.

During these outages, the phones give forth no dial tones, but a rapid mechanical clicking is heard. During this time it is impossible to dial any number.

This condition will for no apparent reason right itself and then calls may be made and received.

It has been noted that sometimes after a call has been completed, should the caller wish to use the phone immediately afterward, the clicking has commensed and may last anywhere from several seconds up to several hours.

SICK, SICK...SICK!

Despite one of the mildest winters on record, the amount of illness among the residents of the community is unusually high.

This is causing a great deal of absenteeism among the school children and many adults are also affected.

Particularly high is the number of kinds of traditional childhood diseases which are making the rounds at this time.

To date there is records of cases of Scarlet Fever, Mumps, Chicken-Pox, Measles and even the now rare Whooping Cough.

This complicated with the usual colds, flu, and other winter respiratory ailments are making some of the children in Chugiak very sick indeed, Particularly when some unfortunate youngsters find themselves host to several of the above mentioned "bugs" at the same time.

The only course we can follow at a time like this is to take all of the known precautions, and see that all signs of illness receive prompt med-

(sickness)

ical attention.

A word of advise which we received and will pass on, is to parents not to be in too much of hurry to send children back to school, particularly if they have had one of the communicable diseases. A child who may appear well, may still be contagious.

The winter is only half over, and things are liable to get worse before they get better. So let us all do our best and try keep ourselves and our families as healthy as possible

# THE COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR JANUARY (See page EULALIA DAVIS 1 for picture)

The Allen Davis Family were in the Sacramento Valley when their thoughts first turned to Alaska.

They had been moving from one part of the country to another trying to find a place where their daughter Peggy would be free of the sinus ailment that she had been suffering from.

When a friend told them that Alaska was the place for them, they packed up and took off, arriving at mile 14 on September 6 of 1951.

Since that day, Eulalia, or Eulie as all her friends know her, has been one of the most devoted persons to the welfare of this community.

While her children were attending the Chugiak School, Eulie was busy with the PTA, serving one year as president of that organization. Today she is still active although her children are both grown and married.

The Methodist Church in Chugiak owes it's being in a good measure to the activities of Eulie who helped to get the church started in this community and is at present a member of the official board.

Among the many community service groups which Eulie helped get started is the Girl Scouts and the Health Council of which she is one of the original members.

Long before there was any official Welfare group in Chugiak Eulie and two other persons in the community took it upon themselves to look after the needy families in the community and see that they were remembered at Christmas time as well as throughout the remainder of the year,

When the Chugiak Welfare Society was finally organized, there is no need to say who one of the organizers was.

Eulie also has claim to the distinction of being the only woman to ever have served as a member of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. She answered many of the ambulance calls, and maintains the list of the "walking blood bank", members of the community who have offered to act as blood donors in any emergency.

Last winter Eulie organized a blood typing program in Chugiak in cooperation with the department of Civil Defense.

Although her work for the community takes up much of her time, Eulie is frequently on the road as the local representative for the Minnesota Woolen Company, and on special occasions will work as cook at Fire Lake Lodge.

Both of the Davis children Peggy (who we are happy to say never suffered from sinus trouble again) and Judy are married. Peggy living in Phoenix Arizona and Judy here in Eagle River. Mr. Davis is an employee at Ft. Richardson.

Eulie has told us that since she is of pure Dutch decent, all of her recipes will be old Dutch ones which have been handed down to her from her mother.

She begins with, an old Pennsylvania Dutch pudding, which would have been appropriate last week during the Holidays, but which is good at any time. She calls it:

(cook of the Month)

POOR MANS PUDDING  
(Usually a Holiday Pudding, but good anytime)

- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup suet (ground)
- 1 cup milk
- 3 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 1 cup brown sugar or molasses

MIX dry ingredients with raisins and suet

STIR in milk

POUR into mold

PLACE in steamer and steam for three hours

(Steamer may be improvised by placing mold on rack or small pan in large covered kettle with small amount of water in bottom.)

SERVE HOT with hot dressing

DRESSING:

- 1 tbs butter
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tbs flour or cornstarch
- 1 pt warm water

MIX together

BOIL until thickened, stirring constantly

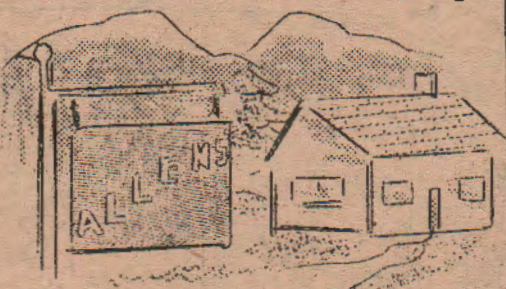

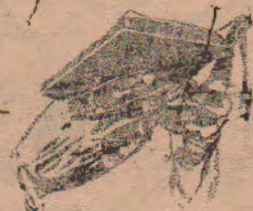

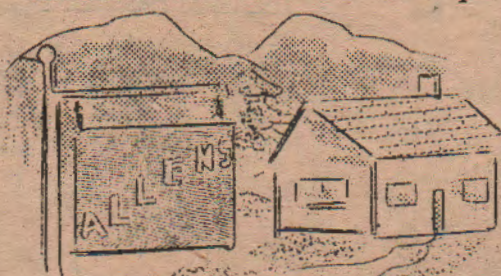
