I don't think you wrote that letter, because it doesn't sound like a fireman wrote it. Any VOLUNTEER fireman worth his salt wants to be recognized as such. , Obvious attire is the history of the volunteers. Visit any Volunteer Fireman's Museum and you will see the ornate fire engines, helmet, belt buckles, flags, horms bells, fire buckets and uniforms. The colors and designes tell of the ideals, hopes, goals and history of the different Volunteer Fire Companys. Volunteers are called "Vamps" today, because of the gaily colored socks worn by our early volunteer firemen. Go to any Fireman's Day Parade during a Volunteer Firemans Convention and you would find that the only national holiday that could compare in festive atmosphers, colorful and obvious attire would be an oldfashioned Fourth of July Celebration.





The next meeting of the club will be at the home of Dee Steeby with Elsie Burroughs acting as hostess.


