The 1 Mt. of Faville Halverson on Eklutna Drive was broken into and a Television set and several other items stolen.

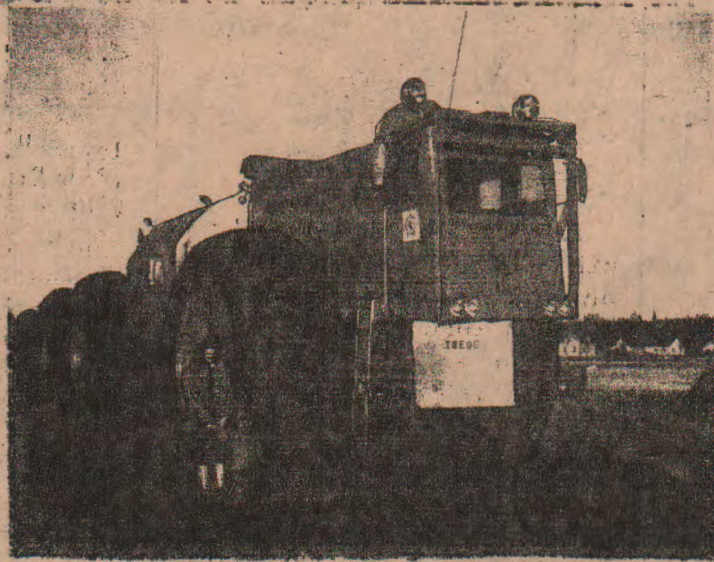
The theft was discovered by Pete Halverson, who had been checking on his parents' home during their absence on a trip to the states.

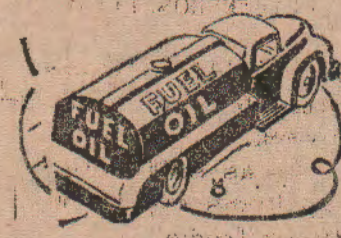
"...Next lets take up the lights
siren and other obvious attire.

I don't think you wrote that
letter, because it doesn't sound
like a fireman wrote it. Any
VOLUNTEER fireman worth his salt
wants to be recognized as such.
Obvious attire is the history of
the volunteers. Visit any Vol-
unteer Fireman's Museum and you
will see the ornate fire engines,
helmet, belt buckles, flags, horns
bells, fire buckets and uniforms.
The colors and designs tell of
the ideals, hopes, goals and his-
tory of the different Volunteer
Fire Companys. Volunteers are
called "Vamps" today, because of
the gaily colored socks worn by
our early volunteer firemen. Go
to any Fireman's Day Parade dur-
ing a Volunteer Firemans Con-
vention and you would find that the
only national holiday that could
compare in festive atmospheres,
colorful and obvious attire would
be an oldfashioned Fourth of July
Celebration.

As to the lights and sirens,
let's quote state law Sect. 3-
218. (A) Every authorized em-
ergency vehicle shall in addi-
tion to any other equipment and
distinctive marking required by
these regulations (Chugiak Vol.
Fire Co. stickers in obvious
places on our vehicles) be eq-
uipped with a siren, exhaust
whistles or bell capable of giv-
ing an audible signal.

(D) Every other (the police)
emergency vehicle shall in ad-
dition to any other equipment
or distinctive markings, be...

vehicle, and displaying a light which is of sufficient intensity as to be clearly visible to the front and to the rear at a distance of 500 feet in normal sunlight.

Sect. 3-401 (d) Any authorized emergency vehicle shall be equipped with a siren, whistle, or bell capable of emitting sound audible under normal conditions from a distance of not less than 500 feet, but such sirens, whistle or bell shall not be used except when such vehicle is operated in response to an emergency or in the immediate pursuit of an actual or suspected violator of the law in which said latter events the driver of such vehicle shall sound said siren when reasonably necessary to warn pedestrians and other drivers of the approach thereof.

...Could it be that your organization is breaking the law?

The fight of many Vol. Fire Companies to get "Blue" lights for their vehicles made history in the past twenty years. Again your knowledge of Volunteers seems lacking.

Common ordinary standards for Vol. Companies has always been, and if you doubt me, check with the National Fire Protection Association; (A) to issue to each fireman and fire officer a badge designating his rank or assignment and if he has an automobile an insignia to put upon it so it may readily be recognized. (B) to have a few of the older and less active men designated as police at fires or other mishaps and if possible if provided by law such as in many states (sect. 209C of General Municipal Law of New York State) (cont page 7 col 3)

The busy lady who is our cook for February is well known to almost everyone in the community.

Lorraine Johnson, who may be seen almost every day of the week behind the counter at Lorraines Dept. Store in Eagle River, admits that these days she has little time for cooking, but when ever she can find the time she loves to entertain in her lovely modern home in the Phillips sub-division.

Lorraine and Art came to Alaska from Seattle in 1950 when Art went to work for the Evan-Jones Coal Co. at the Jonesville mine.

The Johnsons lived at Jonesville and later in Palmer while Art worked there.

Lorraine became known to the residents of Chugiak when she became a representative for the Minnesota Woolen Co. and made frequent visits throughout the community selling those popular garments.

In October of 1956 Lorraine bought the "Togs and Seams" shop in Palmer, but was not satisfied with her location, and six months later, in April of 1957 she and Art moved their entire stock to Chugiak, where they reopened as Lorraines Dept. Store in the Eagle River Shopping Center.

Lorraines home is her pride and joy, and lovely early American furnishings are the envy of many of her friends.

Although Lorraine entertains on a small scale now, there were the days back at the mine when cooking for a large group was common practice.

Lorraines recalls one picnic when she prepared fifty chickens.

COOK FOR FEBRUARY

For her first recipe, Lorraine is fulfilling the desires of the Friendly Neighbors Club when the ladies requested the recipe for the delicious dessert she served the group at a recent meeting.

JELLO DELIGHT

2 pkgs Strawberry Jello
Whole graham crackers (amt varies with size of pan used)
1 cube butter or oleo
1 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
s small can crused pineapple
Walnuts (optional)

PLACE layer of whole graham crackers on bottom of pyrex baking dish
CREAM butter and sugar together.

ADD pineapple (drained)
ADD nuts

FOLD in beaten egg yolks
POUR mixture over crackers in baking dish

PLACE a second layer of graham crackers on top

PREPARE Jello according to instructions on pkg.

ALLOW to partially congeal
POUR over mixture in baking dish
ALLOW to stand at least 2 hours
SERVE with whipped cream.

and sworn in as deputy sheriffs. Their duties shall be to act as Traffic Officers, to prevent untrained personnel from exposing themselves to hazardous conditions, from interfering with rescue and fire fighting, to establish and maintain fire lines, to clear all unauthorized vehicles from the area, to prevent the hose from being driven over and to effect evacuation when necessary. (Sect. 2-1110 Alaska Law.)

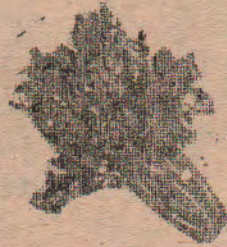
