## Fire Co. Gets New Ambulance

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. has just put into service a newly overhauled 1941 Packard ambulance, a gift from the Alaska Racing Association to the community.

Lt. Ted Brink, of the Rescue division stated that this is a factory built ambulance, fully enclosed and heated; a considerable improvement over the panel truck which has served as an ambulance in the past.

This new vehicle is fully equipped with a resuscitator and medical supplies and is designed to transport injured persons to the hospital and to administer First Aid enroute.

OPEN SEASON

From reports which have been  
pouring in these last few  
days, we are lead to believe  
that the moose of our area  
have declared open season  
on motorists. Unfortunately  
for the moose, they are them-  
selves the victims of these  
encounters.

Which brings to mind again  
the oft repeated warnings  
about being always on the look  
out for these huge beasts as  
we drive the highways and side  
roads of this area.

Signs have been posted al-  
ong the highway warning of  
the places that are favorites  
of the moose when they are  
bent on seeing what is on the  
other side of the road; how-  
ever, the beasts do not always  
stay within these limits, and  
are liable to pop out of the  
brush at any point.

There isn't too much one  
can do when one of these an-  
imals darts out in front of  
a car that is traveling at

However, there are a few

When one observes a moose  
crossing a road up ahead; it  
is a safe policy to assume

Also, when a moose starts  
out to cross in front of a  
car, sharp blasts on the cars  
horn will frequently cause  
it to change it's mind and  
head back for the brush.

In any event, if such an  
unhappy meeting occur, the  
department of Fish and Game  
should be notified, so that  
they can dispatch the injur-  
ed animal and take care of  
the meat before it spoils.

the Welfare division.


Mrs. Kull was known in Chugiak



Lorraines husband Art, is quite fond of the flavor of peanuts, and Lorraine has several deserts which make use of this flavorful and nutritious food.

SCALLOPED APPLES WITH PEANUT BUTTER

6 large tart apples  
1/2 tsp salt  
3/4 pound peanut brittle  
4 tbs lemon juice

CUT thinly sliced apples over bottom of a baking dish  
SPRINKLE with salt  
PLACE a layer of peanut brittle (broken into small pieces) on top of apples  
REPEAT with layer of apples & candy until all are used.  
POUR lemon juice on top layer of apples before adding last layer of brittle  
BAKE in slow oven for 1 hr.

BLARNEY STONES

5 eggs (reserve whites of 2 eggs)  
2 cups sugar  
3 cup flour  
1 cup boiling water  
1 tsp vanilla  
Pinch salt  
3 tsp baking powder  
BEAT eggs until light  
ADD sugar, water, flour, baking powder, salt & vanilla  
BEAT well  
POUR into square pan  
BAKE at 350° for 35 min. or until done.  
COOL and cut into squares  
FROST with....

ICING:  
1/2 spanish peanuts ground very fine  
1/2 butter  
1/2 powdered sugar  
MIX and add to egg whites beaten stiff (next col.)

ADD tsp vanilla  
FROST cakes on all sides  
ROLL in chopped nuts.
