MTA Reveals Plans For Improved Service

Improved phone service for, Chugiak Subscribers is the ultimate goal of several surveys now underway in the area.

Max Clements manager for the Matanuska Telephone Association announced that the MTA has just completed the first phase of a survey to prepare for the location of a second exchange building,

This exchange would be of the same kind as is now located at mile 17% and would be placed somewhere in the Eagle River area.

Chements said that the great concentration of phones in that area is too heavy for the present cables to take care of, and the building of a second exchange would be less costly than any other means of installing more trunk lines.

A survey is also being planned to determine whether or not toll free service to inchorage from Chugiak is possible.

Clements stated that guestioniers are being prepared in an effort to determine how many present and prospective subscribers would be using the lines between Chugiak and Anchorage and to what degree, if toll free service were available.

Clements said the prospect for this toll-free service in the near future seemed very favorable at this time.

When questioned about the prospect of toll-frec service between Chugiak and Talmer, Clements said that there seemed to be more need for the lines to inchorage at the pres ent time.

Chugiak high school seniors have been informed that applications are being accepted for the Scholarship which has been made available to them by the Members of the Chugiak Ladies Club.


Any desiring to apply may get complete information at room 109 at the Anchorage High School.

There are three acancies to the board which are to be filled at the annual membership meeting on April 8th.


Stephens, who lives at mile 21½ operates the Peters Creek Fuel Delivery and the Peters Creek Service Station.



For her last recipe, Lorraine gives a hearty salad that would be very appropriate for a main dish at a ladies luncheon.

MEATY SALAD RING

- 1 tbs. (1 envelope) unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water ,
- 2 tbs. lemon juice
- 2 tsp. horse-radish
- 2 tsp prepared mustard
- 1 cup mayonnaise or salad
- dressing ½ tsp salt
- 12 ox jar cooked cured tongue
 (2 cups) diced
 1 cup diced celery
- 2 tbsp minced onion

SOFTEN gelatin incold water DISSOLVE over hot water ADD lemon juice, horse radish, mustard, dressing & salt MIX thoroughly ADD remaining ingredients CHILL in oiled 8" ring mold until firm

UNMOLD

FILL center with crisp lettuce tomato wedeges and hard cooked egg slices. SERVES 6 to 8.

The group meets again tonight at the home of Bonnie Flint in Eagle River.


GARDEN CLUB TO MEET




