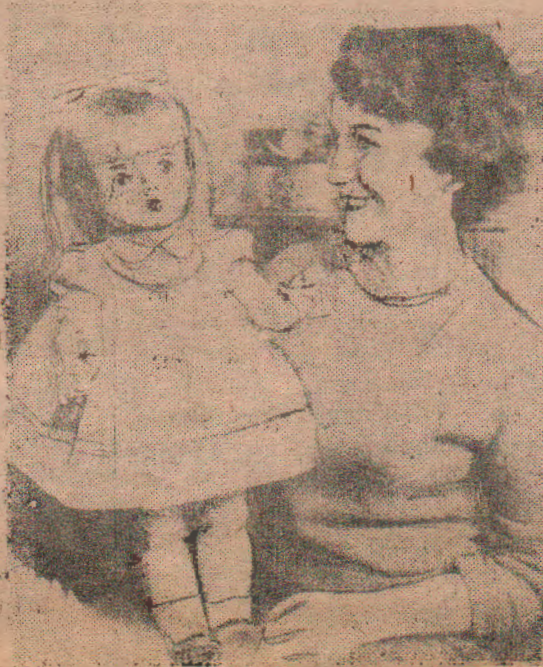

Mr. Morse, the coach, said that there is a need of transportation for the boys from the Eagle River area to the practice rink on upper Fire Lake. The boys practice on Monday and Friday evenings and on Saturday afternoons.

The practice sessions are open to the public and spectators are welcome.

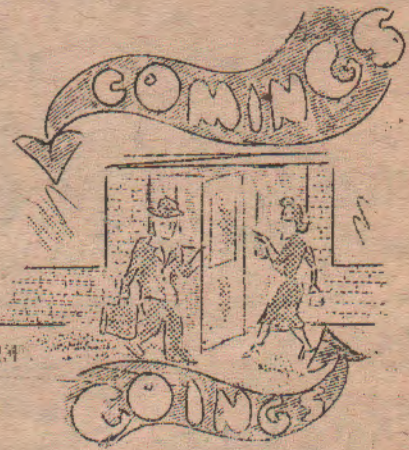

Railroad for whom he works.

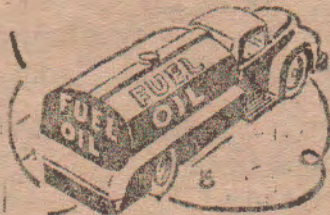

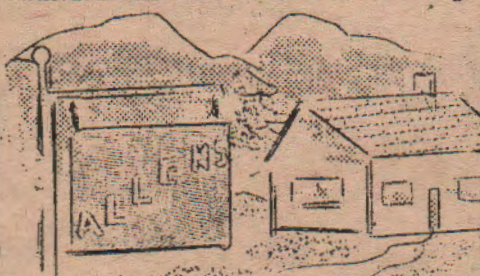

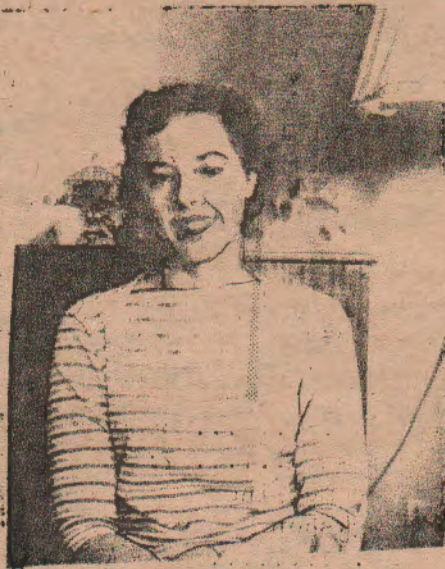

- ROLL chicken in flour seasoned in salt, pepper, paprika, garlic powder and poultry seasoning to taste
- BROWN in hot fat

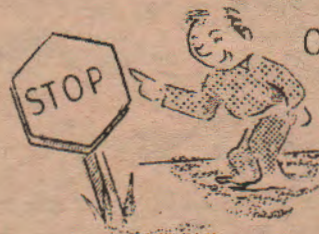

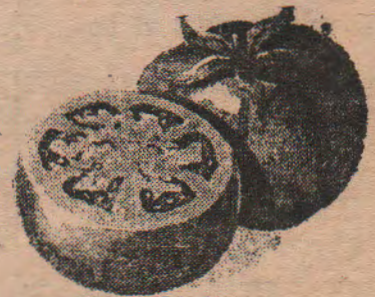
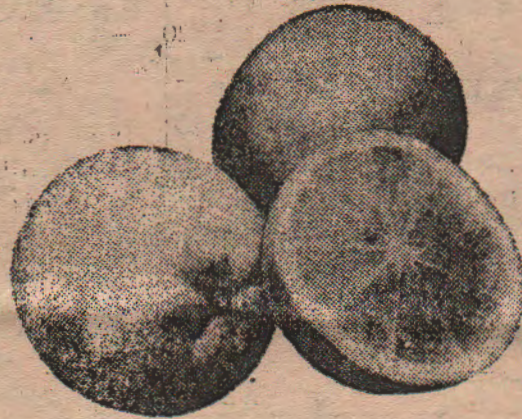
