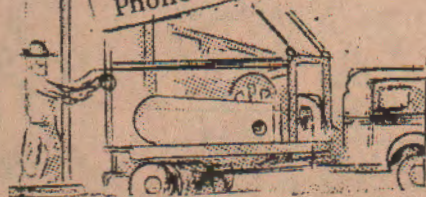

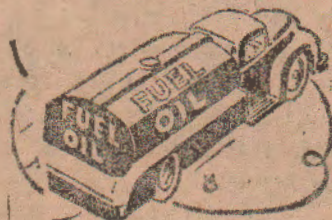

In a day when most of the new generation think of soup as coming out of a can, the aroma of a spou kettle simmering slowly on the back of the stove is a forgotten memory.

Not so at the Lund household Jody frequently treats her family to this hearty vegetable soup that is a meal in itself.

VEGETABLE SOUP

- 2# cubed meat (moose, beef or caribou)
- or 3# Soup bone
- 2 1/2 qts water
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 tsp Oregano
- Pepper to taste
- 2 cups fresh or canned tomatoes

- 1 onion quartered
- 2 cups chopped cabbage
- 1/4 cup rice (uncooked) or pearl barley

- 2 cups cut green beans
- 1 1/2 cups diced potatoes
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 cup diced carrots

BROWN MEAT in hot fat
 ADD meat and drippings to water in soup kettle
 ADD onion and salt
 COOK slowly for 2 hours
 ADD remaining ingredients
 CONTINUE cooking 1 hour or until done.
 ADD more water if needed.

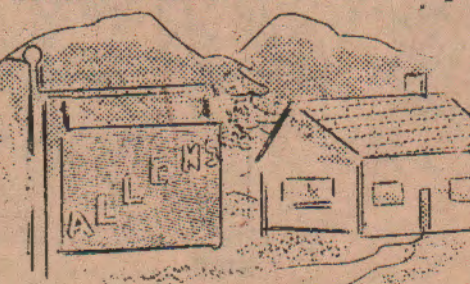

ALASKA SCHOOLS TO GET ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDS

Representative Ralph J. Rivers (D-Alaska) announced passage by the House of Representatives of a Deficiency Appropriation Bill with an Amendment providing \$29,990,000.00 with which to pay the school Districts throughout the nation their full entitlements under Federal school impact laws.

In commenting, Representative Rivers said, "this measure when passed by the senate, as fully expected, would fulfill the Federal Government's previous commitment to assist in paying the cost of schooling for the children of military personell and other Federal personell on Federal installations. I am certainly glad that this much needed money is being made available to the school districts in Alaska.

COURIER ADS GET RESULTS

JAPANESE ENVOYS ARE DUE TUESDAY IN CALIFORNIA
SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. Two Japanese princes and their retinue are scheduled to arrive here Tuesday en route to Washington. The two chief ambassadors --Sim'mi, Prince of Boojisen and Mooraga Prince of Awajsi--have 69 persons in their company, including two doctors and 53 servants. They will arrive on board the U.S. steamer P6whatan, which spent from March 5 to March 18 in Honolulu, where the envoys were entertained by the King and Queen. The envoys are bringing \$100,000 with them to defray expenses though the embassy was invited at the sole expense of the United States. The city treasury here has allotted \$20,000 for their entertainment and a grand reception is scheduled. The envoys are to come to Washington via the Isthmus of Panama.

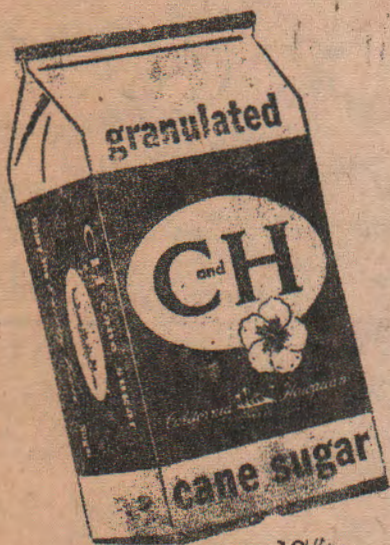
