Bowling Alley Planned Here

A group of local residents is busily laying the ground work for the construction of a bowling alley to be located somewhere in the Chugiak area.

This group, headed by Wes Mickey, Dick Hannen, Roger Jonrowe and Lucille Fly are at present promoting the sale of stock at \$1,000 per share.

Mickey, one of the originators of the scheme, said that a deadline of April 15th has been set, at which time pledges for a minimum of 65 shares must be made. Mickey stated that there are already 35 pledges.

The group will incorporate under the name of either Chugiak Lanes, or Chugiak Bowling Association.

Mickey also stated that the building will be erected on a site yet to be decided upon, but that several were under consideration. The location will be somewhere between mile 22 and Eagle River.

Construction will begin as soon as weather permits, and it is expected to be completed by fall.

**FIVE CHUGIAK ROADS MAY
LOSE FEDERAL AID**

Five Roads in the Chugiak
area have been classified
as roads to be dropped from
the Federal Aid Highway
System.

Two are Secondary "A" Rout-
es, the Eagle River Road and
the Birchwood Road; and three
are secondary "D" routes, the
Eagle River Loop Road, the Fire
Lake Fish Hatchery Road and
the Birchwood Spur. Two sec-
ondary "B" routes in the vicini-
ty of Chugiak which will also
be dropped are the Klutna Lake
Road and the Klutna School
Road.

This was determined following
a study asked by the 1960 Leg-
islature by the Alaska Dept. of
Public Works which presented in
the 1961 session with a 32
page report suggesting a possi-
ble reclassification of the State
Highway system.

The study was asked in a res-
olution enacted last year look-
ing toward the "severe short-
age of available State funds
for maintenance, for matching
Federal aid appropriations and
for administration which could
result at the end of the transi-
tional period if proper plan-
ning are not followed..."

The Dept. report is based on
the premise that Federal aid
should be spent on a bar-
net network which will attract



broken leg.





BRAISED PORK CHOPS IN SAUCE

6 pork chops
2 cans spaghetti sauce with mushrooms

BROWN meat on both sides in hot fat

commendation pending establishment of local government organizations to assume maintenance responsibilities.

The report suggests that these roads be placed on a State-Local cooperative system under which the State would cooperate and contribute to the extent required during a transitional turn over of responsibility to local entities. Future additions to the State highway secondary system would be made from these roads.

Downing emphasized that the report should not be considered "firm and final".

By reason of regulations governing the Federal aid highway program as well as provisions of the Alaska Omnibus Act, he said it would be necessary to obtain approval of the Bureau of Public Roads before any change is made in the existing system.

Neither, he said, could the various changes proposed be undertaken until some form of local government is organized and financially capable of maintaining the existing roads which would be dropped from the Federal system.

"We are", he said, "presenting here a general plan which may take several years to accomplish."
