DOG CLINIC CANCELLED

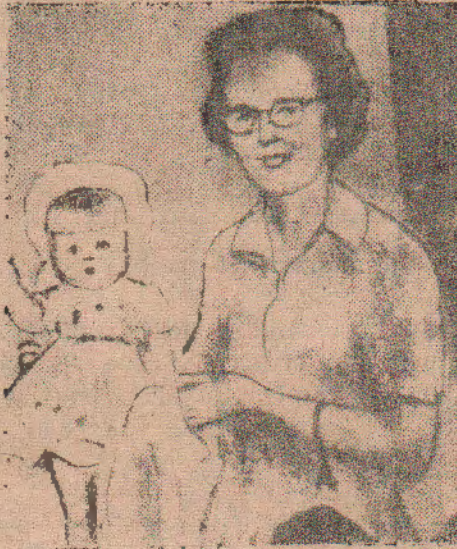
Mrs. Richard Burg, of Burg's Birchwood Kennels, has announced that the proposed dog immunization clinic has been cancelled.

"CARE" CALLS AGAIN

CARE packages as Easter remem-
brances for needy friends and
relatives, orphanages or re-
fugee families are available
for several overseas areas,
it is announced by the North-
east CARE Office in Seattle.

With Easter one of the most
important feasts on the calen-
dars of such countries as Gr-
eece and Yugoslavia, the pack-
age-sending agency explains
that food packages, and for
some areas, wool suiting and
cotten, may be sent to any in-
dividual, family or institut-
ion indicated, with a guaran-
tee of delivery.

For Greece, Berlin and Yug-
oslavia, CARE has \$10 food
packages containing meat, cof-
fee, sweets and many other
necessities, which may be sent
as Easter gifts. For orphan-
ages or other recipients in
Korea, donors may choose from
\$5 food, shoes or children's
underwear parcels, \$10 knitt-
ing wool or cotton parcels for
making clothes, or other items
varying from \$10 farm hand
tools to a physical education
kit for \$25 or stove or knitt-
ing machine for \$30.

For the needy around the
world, CARE packages or con-
tributions in any amount may
be sent to the CARE office,
Fredrick & Nelson, Seattle,
or to local outlets. (In An-

board.

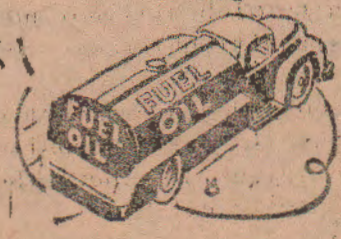

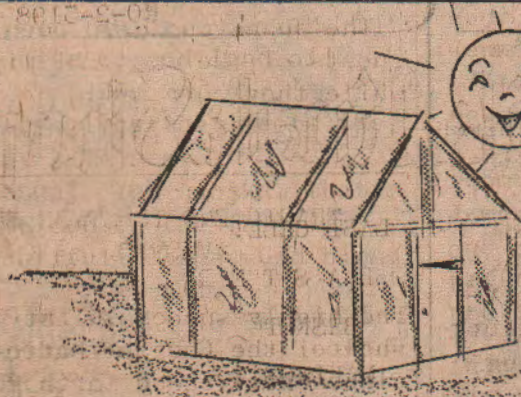

For her final week as cook of the month, Jody has given us the recipes for two of her favorite cakes.

TOWER CAKE

(This makes an unusually large cake)

- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 cup cake flour
- 4 whole eggs
- 1 cup butter milk
- 1 tsp soda
- 1 tsp vanilla
- Spices to taste

CREAM butter & sugar

- ADD eggs gradually
- MIX until creamy
- DISSOLVE soda in Buttermilk
- ADD gradually to batter
- MIX thoroughly
- ADD spices to flour
- SIFT twice

SPREAD batter in 2"x9"x13" pan or in 3 ten inch layer pans BAKE at 350° for 15 -20 min or until done.

FROST with chocolate frosting

MAYONNAISE CAKE

- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tbs cocoa
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 tsp soda

SIFT dry ingredients together ADD 1 cup salad dressing

- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup water

MIX thoroughly bake slowly at 350° for 35 to 40 minutes

FINISH 2 layers FROST with chocolate frosting

- CHOCOLATE FROSTING:
- 1/3 cup melted butter
- 1 1/2 squares baking chocolate
- 1 whole egg
- 1 tsp vanilla

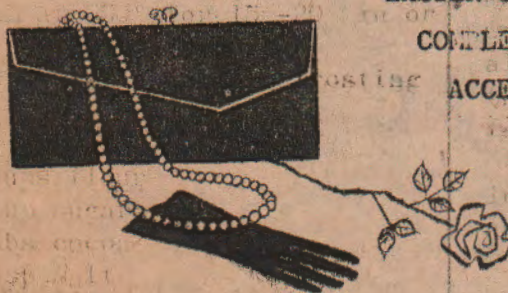
