Like most people who were, raised in Southern California, Jody is very fond of Spanish foods.

For her recipe this week, she gives us two standard dishes around which most Spanish meals are planned.

FRIED BEANS

1 small pkg. pinto beans
1/3 cup catsup
1 medium onion
1/2 pkg. bean pot bacon
1 tbs. Worchestershire: Sauce
2 tbs. vinegar
Salt & pepper to taste
Tabasco sauce to taste

COVER beans well with water COOK with bacon, onion, salt & pepper until done ADD remaining ingredients SIMMER for 15 minutes.

PUT about % inch f bacon grease in skillet.

HEAT until smoking

SPCON beans & juice into hot grease

MASH partially

COOK for 5 to 10 minutes

SERVE with tortillas

2½ tsp baking powder
1½ tsp salt
1½ cup water
5½ tbs. Shortening

dry cough, followed by an inflamation of the whites of the eyes. Later symptoms are a slow hardening of the pads of the dog's feet (hence the name).

This disease is very easily transmitted from sick dogs to well ones and can even be carried on human hands.

More often than not, this disease if fatal, particularly if it is not attended to immediately.

Dog owners who have not had their pets immunized are urged to do so.
