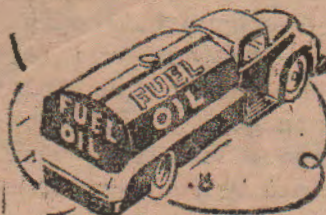

Mrs. Beam was a member of the U.S. Army Team from Ft. Richardson, which finished in fourth place.

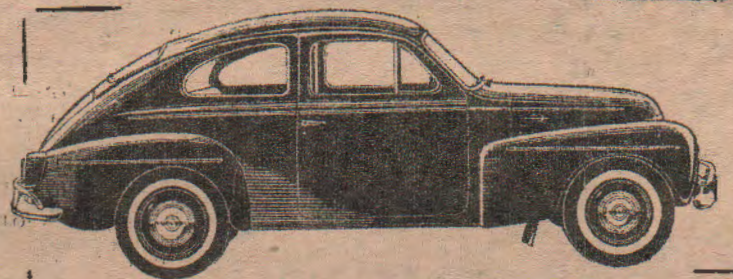
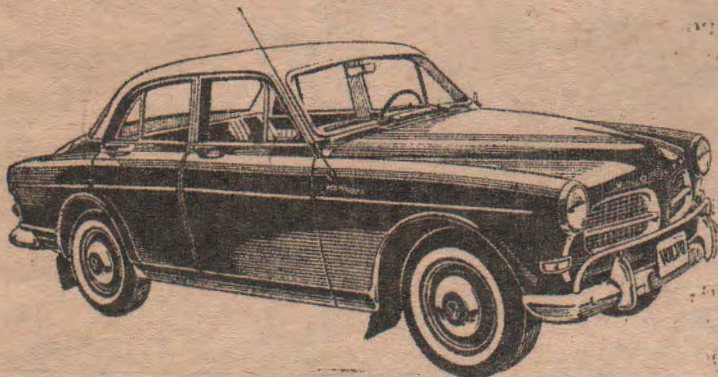

# THE COOK OF THE MONTH

- COOK FOR MARCH -  
JOANNE LUND

Like most people who were raised in Southern California, Jody is very fond of Spanish foods.

For her recipe this week, she gives us two standard dishes around which most Spanish meals are planned.

## FRIED BEANS WITH TORTILLAS

- 1 small pkg. pinto beans
- 1/3 cup catsup
- 1 medium onion
- 1/2 pkg. bean pot bacon
- 1 tbs. Worcestershire Sauce
- 2 tbs. vinegar
- Salt & pepper to taste
- Tabasco sauce to taste

COVER beans well with water  
 COOK with bacon, onion, salt & pepper until done  
 ADD remaining ingredients  
 SIMMER for 15 minutes.  
 TO FRY:

PUT about 1/2 inch of bacon grease in skillet.

HEAT until smoking  
SPON beans & juice into hot grease

MASH partially  
COOK for 5 to 10 minutes  
SERVE with tortillas

### FLOUR TORTILLAS:

- 5 cups flour
- 2 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 1/2 cup water
- 5/8 tbs. Shortening

COMBINE all ingredients except the water

MIX thoroughly with hands  
ADD water

KNEAD and knead until elastic  
ROLL very thin on floured surface

GREASE skillet lightly, as for griddle cakes

BROWN tortillas on both sides in hot skillet, pressing out air bubbles with cloth

The next school movie will be Friday, March 24th.

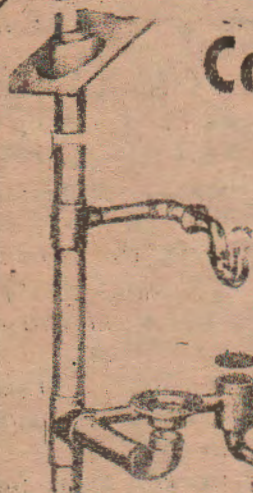
A St. Patricks Day dance is scheduled for the multi-purpose room next Friday, March 17th.

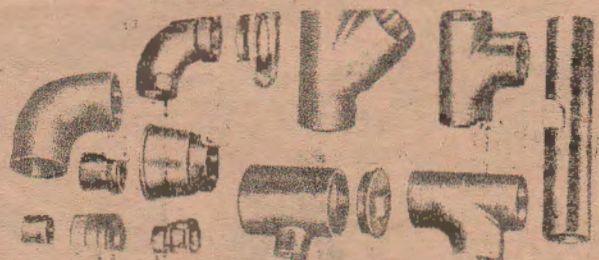

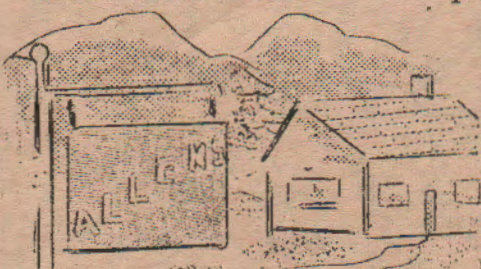

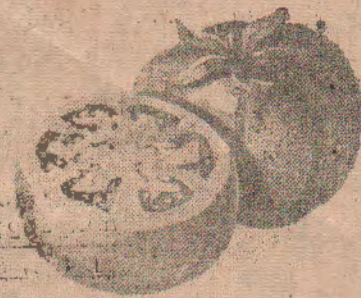
