tha share with us her own Meat Loaf, recipe which may be used with either moose or caribou burger.

caribou burger. Martha says, "...I have my moose or caribou ground twice for burger with beef suet added in proportion of 1 part of suet to 4 parts of meat.

I mix the below ingredients and place in a loaf pan, top with bacon and bake at 350°.

2 lbs ground meat 2 eggs 1 cup bread crumbs ½ cup minced onion ½ cup celery, diced fine 1 cup milk 1½ tsp salt ½ tsp popper 1 clove garlic, minced 1 tsp celery salt 1 tsp mustard ½ tsp thyme 3 or 4 bacon slices.

SALMON FISHING PROVIDES WINTER SPORT

Lake Lucille, an Alaska Depart tment of Fish and Game rehabilitated lake in the Matanuska Valley, has provided a highly successful and popular sport fishery for silver salmon this past winter, Fishery Biologist Rupert Andrews of Palmer has reported.

Land locked sliver salmon fry planted in this lake during 1958 and 1959 were averaging 9 inches and ranged from 7 to 15 inches in length as observed from sportsmen's catches. Fishing success was high with limit catches of 10 fish common. Spot creel checks throughout the scason by Department personnel revealed an average catch of 5 fish per fisherman.

Veekend fishing during the last weeks of the season was especially intensive due to the prevalent calm, clear weather (cont col 3)

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

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
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


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
