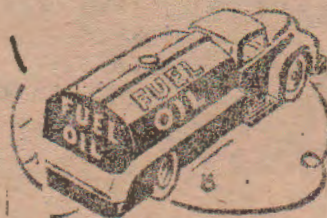
COOK INLET SPORT FISHING  
SEASON TO REDPEN MAY 28

Anglers are cautioned that the trout and salmon sport fishing season closed on March 31st will not reopen until May 28<sup>th</sup> in the Cook Inlet area.

Sportsmen in the Anchorage area are also reminded of the special steelhead season presently in effect in the Susitna River drainage. This season limits the take to steelhead trout which must be over 20 inches in length. All fish under 20 inches are to be released unharmed.

A successful hunter like Martha is sure to have a favorite way of preparing her game.

For her second recipe, Martha share with us her own Meat Loaf, recipe which may be used with either moose or caribou burger.

Martha says, "...I have my moose or caribou ground twice for burger with beef suet added in proportion of 1 part of suet to 4 parts of meat.

I mix the below ingredients and place in a loaf pan, top with bacon and bake at 350°.

- 2 lbs ground meat
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup minced onion
- 1/2 cup celery, diced fine
- 1 cup milk
- 1 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 tsp celery salt
- 1 tsp mustard
- 1/2 tsp thyme
- 3 or 4 bacon slices.

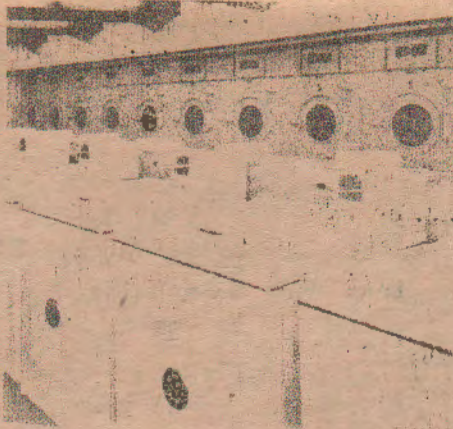

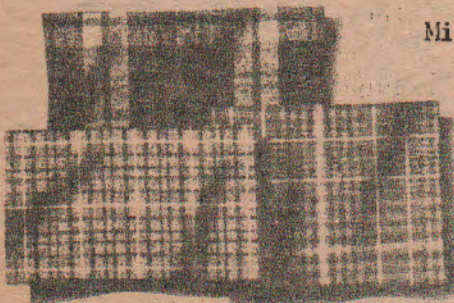

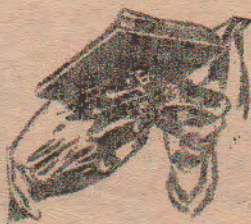

Max Clements, manager for the

Matanuska Telephone Assoc. has stated that the M.T.A. recognizes the need for improving service to Chugiak subscribers, and promises that they will not be inconvenienced by prolonged outages in the future.

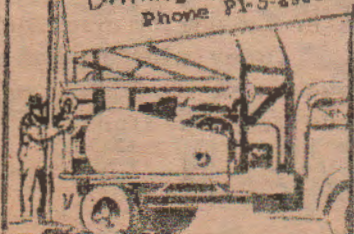

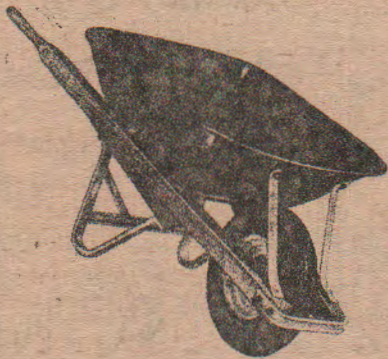

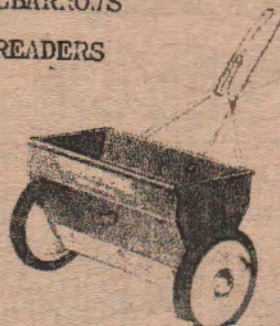

## SALMON FISHING PROVIDES WINTER SPORT

Lake Lucille, an Alaska Depart-  
ment of Fish and Game rehab-  
ilitated lake in the Matanus-  
ka Valley, has provided a  
highly successful and popular  
sport fishery for silver sal-  
mon this past winter, Fishery  
Biologist Rupert Andrews of  
Palmer has reported.

Land locked silver salmon  
fry planted in this lake dur-  
ing 1958 and 1959 were averag-  
ing 9 inches and ranged from 7  
to 15 inches in length as ob-  
served from sportsmen's catches.  
Fishing success was high with  
limit catches of 10 fish com-  
mon. Spot creel checks through-  
out the season by Department per-  
sonnel revealed an average cat-  
ch of 5 fish per fisherman.

Weekend fishing during the  
last weeks of the season was  
especially intensive due to the
