Orval Lake of Sitka Alaska is staying with his son Jim at Swanee Slopes. Mr. Lake is working as janitor at the Chugiak School.

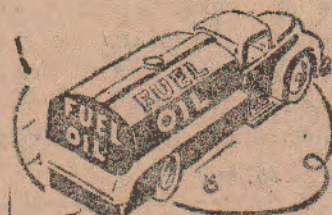
Kenny and Nancy Hart of mile 22 have left for a vacation in the south 48, where they will be visiting Kenny's parents.

Here is something that many of the weight watching ladies will be happy to have. A recipe for a delicious rich looking pie that is low in calories. Martha sees many local ladies buying reducing compounds at the Knik Knak Shop, and felt that they might enjoy a tempting dessert that would still permit them to keep on their diets.

LOW CALORIE CUSTARD PIE

- 1 1/4 cup skim milk
- 4 tbs non-fat dry milk
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 tbs. liquid sucaryl
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 8" unbaked pie shell
- 1/2 tsp nutmeg

MIX skim milk and dry milk
BEAT eggs, gradually
ADD remaining ingredients except nutmeg
ADD scalded mixture, gradually beating constantly to keep from curdling.
POUR mixture into pie shell
BAKE at 425° for 10 minutes
REDUCE heat to 325°
CONTINUE baking until knife inserted in center comes out clean.

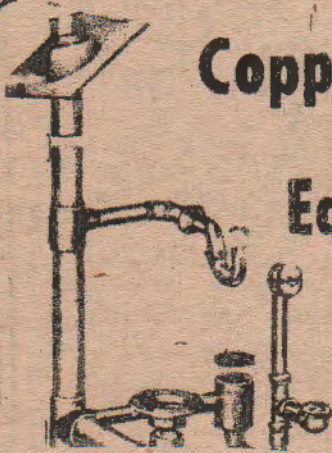

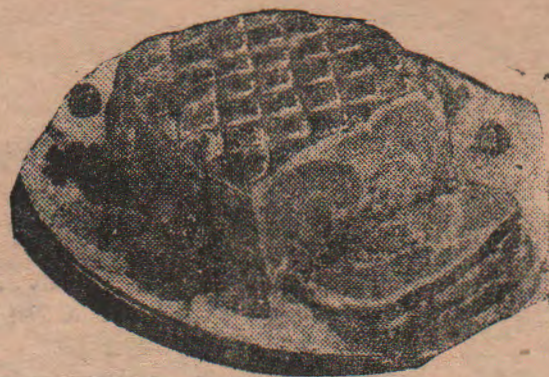
