Fire Phone Employs New System

Emergency calls to the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. will be acted on more promptly in the future, due to a new system which has been adopted with the cooperation with MTA.

In the past when the number HO-2-5555 was dialed a phone in one or two definite locations was rung, and the information then forwarded to the individual Firemen by the dispatcher on duty.

Now, when the emergency number is dialed, all the phones that are installed in the homes of Volunteer Firemen will ring at the same time, and the information concerning the emergency disseminated immediately. This will save precious minutes and enable the Firemen to answer the calls immediately.

Any calls dialed on the emergency number will take precedence over any other calls that may be in progress on any of the Firemans lines, and the lines will be automatically cleared so that the emergency calls can go through without delay.

Ed White, business manager for the Fire Co. has asked that everyone bear in mind that HO-2-5555 is an emergency number, and should never be used for personal calls.

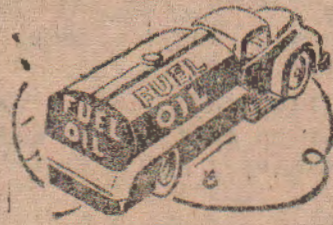

THE COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR APRIL
MARTHA HALL

As she leaves us, Martha gives two of her favorite "tricks".

One a way to prepare those moose or caribou steaks which turn up so frequently on Alaskan dinner tables, and the other a real party way to prepare poultry or game birds on a rotisserie.

MOOSE OR CARIBOU STEAK TRIM any dried edges, fat or tissue from boneless steak. **CUT** in serving size pieces **POUND** in a mixture of

- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 tsp celery salt
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp pepper
- 1 tsp poultry seasoning or
- 1/2 tsp thyme (using a meat mallet or edge of a saucer.

FRY in plenty of fat **TURN** often until each piece is nicely browned and done The flouring keeps the meat juices inside the meat and even the toughest moose will be tender & tasty.

BROILED WHOLE CHICKEN

WASH one whole frying chicken (or broiling chicken) **DRY** well **COAT** with a good mayonaisse, salt & pepper, (I also use a barbecue or savory salt) **PLACE** on spit of rotisserie **ROTO-BROIL** for 1 hour or until done.

Cornish game hens are scrump-cuous cooked the same way. The mayonaisse keeps the meat moist so it does not need to be basted.

HOME DEMONSTRATION WEEK PROCLAIMED

Governor William A Egan has officially proclaimed the Week of April 30th through May 6th as Home Demonstration week in Alaska.

FIRE MARSHALL URGES CLEAN-UP

With an eye to the spring cleannp, State Fire Marshall Robert F. Crouse today recommended to Alaskans a five point program "to remove most of the common cuases of fires in homes".

He recommended:

1. Clean out stacks of newspapers and magazines, discarded clothing, mattresses and other items which fre-

quently collect in attics, basements and closets. 2. Do the same cleanup job in the home workshop with shavings, scraps, oily rags and old paints as the target.

3. Don't forget the trash accumulating in the garage or the dead grass and brush around the house.

4. Repair defective electrical cords and plugs and check appliances, calling a competent electrician if they need attention.

5. Have your furnace, chimney and stoves inspected and cleaned.

ANSWERS TO SOME OF YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS

QUESTION: I have a cleaning lady who comes once a week to help with the house work. I pay her \$12.00 for the day. Do I have to pay the social security tax and what should I do?

ANSWER: If you pay your cleaning lady as much as \$50 cash in a calendar quarter, you must pay the social security tax. Twelve dollars a week would amount to \$156.00 in a quarter. Keep a record of her name and social security number and how much you pay her.

Notify the District Director of Internal Revenue that you have a household employee. He will send you the simple tax form HO. 942 at the end of the quarter. The total social security tax is 6 percent of the cash wages paid. Three percent deducted from your worker's wages and three percent added by you. A form for notifying the Director of Internal Revenue may be obtained from your social security office.

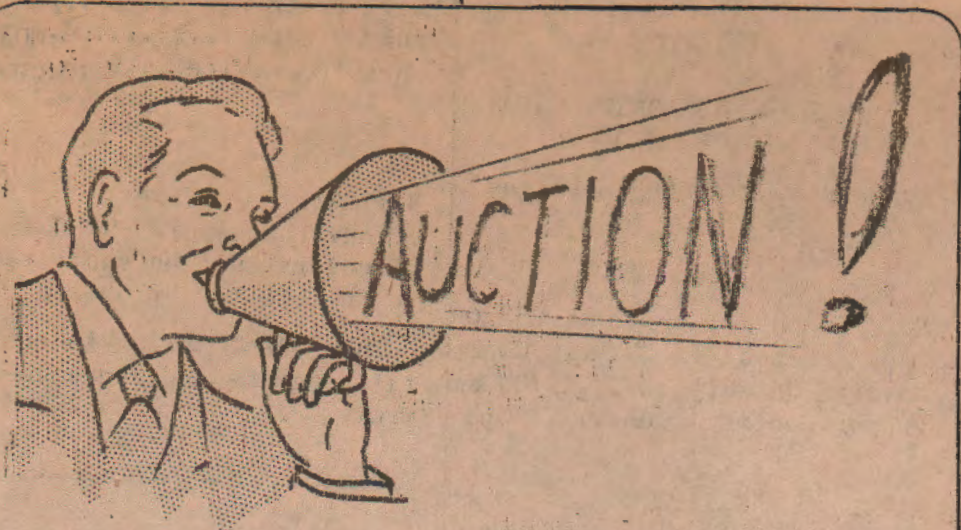

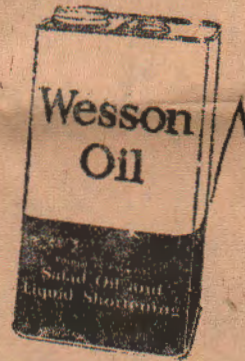
