In 1957, Billie entered the baking contest of the Anchorage Fur Rendezvous, and came away with second prize in the pie division.

Her recipe for this week is this prize winning recipe for a lemon pie that is really different.

Billie says that even those who don't care for lemon pie will like this one, and lemon lovers will really go in-to orbit.

LEMON VELVET PIE

MIX TOGETHER:

- 1 2/3 cups sugar
- 6 tbs corn starch
- 1/2 tsp salt

ADD mixture slowly (stirring constantly) to

- 1 1/2 cups boiling water

COOK over direct heat, stirring occasionally until thick and smooth.

PLACE over boiling water and cook 15 minutes longer.

ADD 2 well beaten egg yolks

- 2 tbs butter

COOK 2 minutes longer

REMOVE from heat

ADD 1/3 cup strained lemon juice

- 1 tsp vanilla extract

REMOVE one scant cup of mixture and set aside to cool.

ADD to remaining hot liquid

- 1 tbs unflavored gelatin (softened in 1/2 cup water)

STIR until dissolved.

BLEND in one cup canned milk

COOL:

WHEN mixture begins to jell, FOLD in 2 stiffly beaten egg whites.

POUR into baked pie shell

COVER or GARNISH with cup of reserved filling.

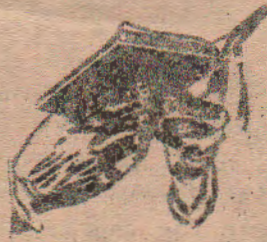

A TEST OF NERVES

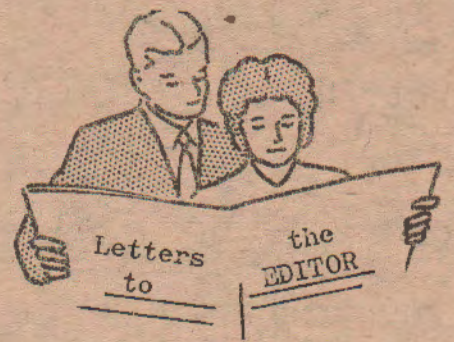
Jerry Rankin, top Chugiak Speller, found out along with the other contestants that a spelling Bee is as much a test of nerves, as it is a test of spelling ability.

Open Letter to the people of Chugiak:

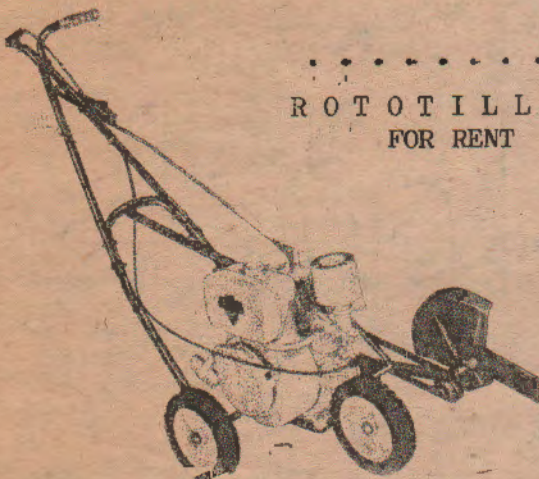
".. Mrs. Emmert and I wish to thank the children, parents and friends who gave us such a wonderful send-off at the Shopping Center coffee hour.
