

Precinct Division To Be Discussed

George Allen, Democratic Chairman for the Chugiak Precinct, has announced the holding of a non-partisan community meeting at the Chugiak School at 8pm on Thursday, May 18th.

At this time the proposed division of Chugiak into three separate precincts will be discussed.

This subject was brought up at an emergency meeting at the Half-Mile House last Wednesday, at which time Sec. of State for Alaska, Hugh J. Wade was present to explain the matter.

It was felt that insufficient notice of this meeting had been given to enable all interested parties to attend; therefore a second meeting on this subject has

COMMUNITY BAROMETER

We have often noted how the enrollment of the Chugiak School is a fairly accurate barometer of the population of our community.

For example, this year, while the enrollment at the school was pretty much the same at the end of the year as it was at the beginning, there were a total of 100 new students who entered the school during the year. This would indicate that an equal number had left, pointing to quite a turnover in population.

Another interesting learned from the school census, is the fact that the largest percentage of the residents of Chugiak own their own homes, as opposed to the minority who are renters.

In the ten years that the Chugiak School has been in operation the enrollment from the original 67 to the present of 543 shows quite plainly how Chugiak has grown and just what the proportion of population increase has been.

All this is very fascinating, and proves once again that the best way to get to know anything about anyone is through their children.

JUNEAU: An up-to-date illustrated official map of Alaska -- showing the 49th State's intra-state highway network on one side, and the route of the Alaska Highway through Canada on the other -- is available now from the Alaska Division of Highways, Juneau at no charge.

The map, which is the first official roadmap produced by the State of Alaska, was printed by Rand McNally.

In addition to showing roads, and highways the map also designates airports and roadside parks.

Included too are illustrations of Alaska wildlife, scenery and attractions plus pictures of the official state flag, seal, bird and flower.

Among these keys are two car keys for a Volkswagen and a Ford, along with several assorted keys of different description.


Those keys have been taken to the Chugiak post-office, and the owner may claim them by identifying them to Postmaster Paul Swanson.

FRIDAY

JUNEAU: An estimated date of May 19th has been announced for the opening of the Denali Highway, through Mt. McKinley National Park.

T.D. Sherard, director of the Alaska Division of Highways, said that he had been apprised of the anticipated opening date by Woody Johansen, District Highway Engineer for the Fairbanks district. The director noted, however, that achieving the May 19th opening is completely dependent on the weather.

Sherard also said that the state's highway crews are working at peak ability now to open all of Alaska's highways and keep them open.

In Richard Stickel's Valdez district, Sherard said, a snow slide closed Mile 39 of the Richardson Highway at 4pm Saturday, but highway crews had reopened the road by 3 a.m. Sunday.

THE Cook of the Month

-COOK FOR MAY-
BY I. BILLIE MOORE

The meat loaf recipe which Billie shares with us this week is one which was sent to her by her mother. Her family always begs Billie to bake an extra one of these to be served sliced cold for sandwiches.

HOT OR COLD MEAT LOAF

1 lb ground beef (better with moose)
 2/3 cup powdered milk
 1/2 cup water
 2 slices bread
 1 egg
 1 tsp dry green pepper flakes
 2 tsp parsley flakes
 2 tbs onion flakes
 2 tsp celery salt
 Pinch pepper
 1/2 tsp salt
 pinch garlic powder
 1 tbs ketchup
 1 tsp prepared mustard
 CRUMBLE bread in bowl
 ADD dry milk and all seasoning
 STIR together
 ADD water & beaten egg
 WORK ingredients to thin
 paste with fork
 ADD meat
 PACK solidly in well oiled
 bowl or tin.
 SET ASIDE for 15-20 minutes to
 season (this is an important step)
 BAKE uncovered @ 375° for 25
 minutes or until done
 SERVE hot, but is especially delicious cold.
 MAKE several of these at one time and store in freezer
 for summer snacks and picnics.



Sec. Wade, or a representative of his office has been invited to attend the meeting.


