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The Cook of the Month

-COOK FOR MAY-
BILLIE MOORE

With berry season close at hand, many of us are thinking in terms of shortcakes.

This week Billie gives us a sponge cake which she says is the best for shortcake she has ever tasted. This is an old recipe handed down to her by her husband's grandmother.

FOUR EGG SPONGE CAKE

- BEAT 4 egg yolks until very thick
- ADD 2 tbs water and
- BEAT until foamy and light
- ADD 12 cups sugar in small amounts while beating
- CONTINUE beating until thick and creamy
- ADD 1 tsp vanilla and
- BEAT well
- ADD 1/2 cup boiling water and continue to beat
- COMBINE 1 1/2 cups sifted flour with 1/2 tsp cream of tartar
- ADD in small amounts to egg mixture
- BEAT well
- FOLD in 4 egg whites beaten stiffly but not dry.
- POUR into 2 loaf pans or one angel food pan (free of any grease)
- BAKE 45 minutes at 290°
- INCREASE to 350° for additional 20 to 25 minutes.
- INVERT and allow to cool before removing from pan.

*Billie says the secret to this cake is in the beating. "Really beat the stuffings out of it after each addition, and you will have a high, rich cake that looks leavened with eggs."

Several hundred persons from all around the State and guests from Outside were present.

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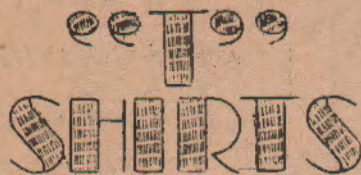


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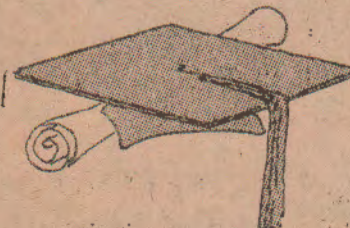

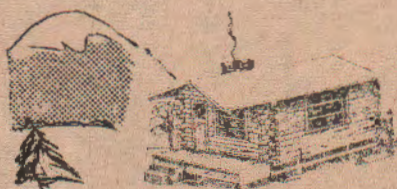
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**DR. WARNS OF DANGER
OF WHOOPING COUGH**

An infant is now in the hospital with whooping cough, which several children in Chugiak have had during the past winter.

Whooping cough is an almost non-existent disease which begins like a cold with sneezing, runny noses, malaise and a hacking cough at night, but seldom is there any fever at first.

A week or two later the cough becomes spasmodic followed by a deep inhalation of air causing the whoop.

The violent coughing may cause vomiting, and crying, sneezing, chilling or over-eating may start the severe coughing attacks.

Within four weeks the coughing usually becomes less frequent and severe, but may occur intermittently for several months.

The younger the child, the more severe the illness and the complications of bronchopneumonia, or encephalitis may occur; thus it behooves one to have medical advice regarding the cure of these children.

The main reason it is an almost non-existent - instead of a non-existent disease is that parents neglect to have their children inoculated as is always advised. These inoculations are available for the asking from the Public Health Department and from your physician for a very (next col.)

minimal charge.

This present case of whooping cough only serves as a warning that we are free of contagious diseases only so long as we avail ourselves of the means of their prevention.

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

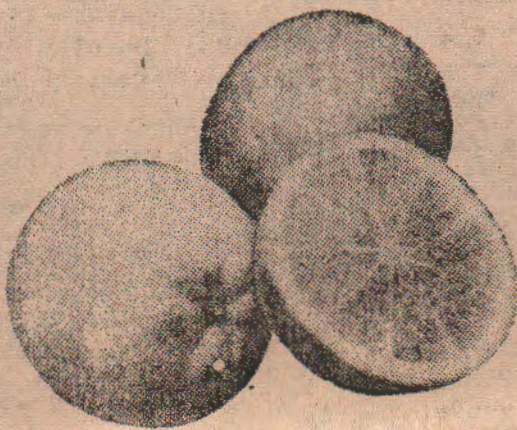
