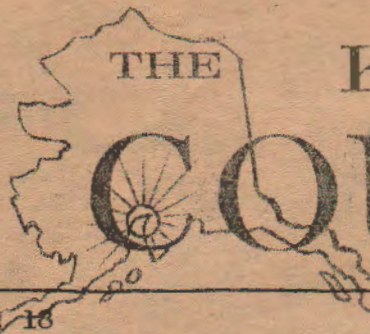

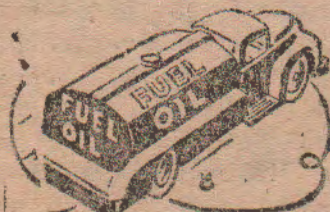

Here is a dish that the Moore's like to have when they come home from a day of skiing.

It can be prepared the day before, and requires only heating up to be a hearty nourishing dinner.

### BAKED BEANS

- 2 cups navy beans
- 1/4 lb salt pork or ham
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp dry mustard
- 2 tbs dark molasses
- 1 onion

- WASH beans
- COVER with water
- SOAK overnight
- COOK slowly until skins burst or until just tender
- DRAIN reserving liquor
- PLACE 1/2 beans in pot or casserole

- BURY part of pork in beans
- ADD half combined remaining ingredients
- ADD remaining beans and seasoning
- PUT remaining pork on top
- QUARTER onion and place around top
- COVER with bean liquor
- COVER and bake in slow oven 250°-300° for 6 to 8 hours.

- ADD more water as necessary.
- SERVE with garlic bread and tossed green salad.
- SERVES 6 to 8

Seven years ago this month Chugiak residents were frantically putting together the first annual Chugiak Carnival. The newly cleared triangular between the old and new Palmer Highway was buzzing with men, women and children laying out fences, booths, tents, and a "bingo" palace" ..all made mostly of birch poles brought up from Birchwood. The Tedrows; the Briggs, the Parks, the Riddells, the McDowells, the Fetrows, the Bellringers... they all were there with hammers, saws and shovels. ....Remember?



Open Letter to the Public from F. Hahn, Chief, Chugiak Vol. Fire Co.

"...I wish to notify the people of Chugiak that the Chugiak Vol. Fire Co. Inc. is still operating it's Fire and Rescue service within the Chugiak area, regardless of contrary reports. We plan to still build a sub-station at Eagle River, on the Homestead Road, and another in Birchwood as soon as we can acquire the property to build on. The sub station at Eagle River will continue to be known as The Eagle River Dept. of the Chugiak Vol. Fire Co. Inc., which it has always been called when the equipment was stationed at Eagle River. Do not make the mistake in thinking that the Eagle River Improvement Assn's. fire company (loosely called the Eagle River Fire Co.) is our sub station, as it is a separate fire company and definitely should not be called the Eagle River Fire Co.

During 1960, the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. Inc. had 25 fire alarms, with a total of 508 man hours expended. These fires were caused by: Cigarettes -2, Defective heating equipment -2, Defective chimney-2, Defective wiring-4, Children with matches-1, Arson-3 and other misc. causes-11. We had a fire loss of \$111,320 in buildings, and \$56,530 loss in contents. We saved \$16,980 in buildings and contents. The large loss is due mostly to delayed alarm, or improper directions to fire. We had 59 Rescue runs with a total of 128 man hours expended. The Vol. Firemen answer all (cont page 6 col 3)
