## Gov. Egan Promises To Support OCHS

CHUGIAK: Operation Chugiak High School has found a powerful friend in the person of Governor Wm. Egan, who met with the executive board of that organization last Saturday at the Eagle River Baptist Church.

Chairman Ed. Willis gave the Governor a run down of the aims of OCHS and told him of the reasons for needing a high school in this area.

The governor informed the group that he was not unacquainted with the need for a high school in Chugiak and has been in favor of one for some time. He further said that a survey was to be made of the educational needs throughout the state, and that the information to be gathered by OCHS would help immeasurably. When asked if OCHS could count on the support of the Governors administration, his answer was in the affirmative.

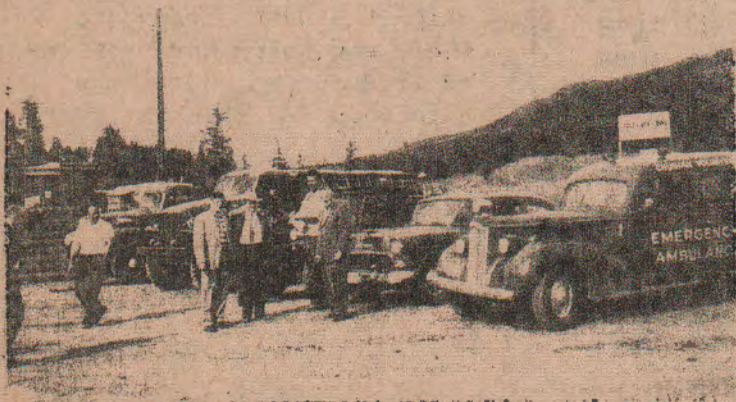
At a meeting of OCHS on Monday, June 12th reports showed that the census was nearly complete and would be in the hands of the compilation committee by Friday.

A RECORD TO BE PROUD OF

Only last week we were speak-  
ing of what the people of  
Chugiak can accomplish thr-  
ough working together.

The other day a matter was  
brought to our attention that  
is but another example of  
the same thing. Through  
the concerted effort of work-  
ing toward a common cause,  
the people of Chugiak have  
achieved a record unequaled  
in the entire State.

All communities in Alaska  
are required to pay a specifi-  
ed sum to the Department of  
Health and Welfare, which is  
used to provide the services  
of a public health nurse for  
their area.

According to information  
which was recently given  
to Mrs. Ralph Long, Presi-  
dent of the Chugiak Health  
Council; Chugiak is the only  
community in the entire State  
of Alaska which has consist-  
antly met this obligation.

Now this is indeed a rec-  
ord to be proud of.

In the past the people of  
Chugiak paid this money from  
funds raised by the community  
sponsored CBA Carnival.

When CBA no longer had the  
money to pay for the nurse,  
the ladies clubs of the area  
(next col.)

(editorial)

under the leadership of the  
Chugiak Ladies Club (then  
known as the Friendly Neigh-  
bors), pitched in and held  
a bazaar, at which the need-  
ed \$400 was raised.

Now once again the time  
has rolled around when this  
payment is due.

The people of Chugiak have  
a wonderful record to pre-  
serve, and it appears that  
they do not intend to let  
the Department of Health  
down.

Already some of the clubs  
have voted funds from their  
treasury to help meet this  
need; and it is expected  
that more will do so.

Four hundred dollars is  
a sizeable sum of money,  
and it will take a bit of  
effort to raise it; but  
the public health nurse  
benefits all of us, and  
we feel sure that the peo-  
ple of this unusual commu-  
nity will come through just  
as they have in the past,  
and the remarkable record  
of Chugiak will remain in-  
tact for another year.

# The Cook of the Month

-COOK FOR JUNE -  
LEANORE LANDRETH

Another unusual recipe, with a tricky name is the one which Leanore gives us this week.

### BUBBLE BREAD

1 cup milk (scalded)  
 1/2 cup shortening or oil  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 tsp salt

MIX together  
 COOL to lukewarm  
 CRUMBLE into above  
 2 cakes yeast

ADD  
 2 beaten eggs  
 4 1/2 cups flour (approx)

MIX to soft dough  
 TURN out on floured board  
 KNEAD until smooth & elastic (not sticky)  
 PLACE in greased bowl  
 COVER with damp cloth  
 ALLOW to rise until double  
 PUNCH down and let rest for 10 minutes  
 MELT 1 stick butter (or oleo) in small pan

MIX  
 1 cup sugar  
 1 tbs cinnamon  
 1/2 cup chopped nuts (opt)  
 1/2 cup raisins (opt)

FORM dough into small balls the size of walnuts  
 ROLL each ball in sugar mixture  
 PLACE in greased angel food pan in staggered rows and layers until all dough is used

LET RAISE  
 BAKE at 350° for 45 minutes  
 TURN out on plate or board while still hot.

TO serve, break off pieces, Do not slice, this will separate into many small spicy buns. Tastes best while still warm.

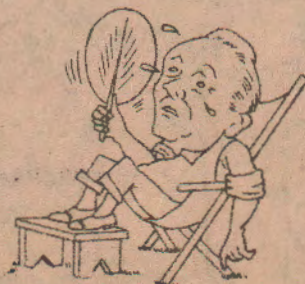

The one team from Chugiak is playing with the Katmai League in Mt. View, and there is not room for any more.

Since each team may have 15 members, there will be spots for 60 boys next year when the local league is formed.

Details on forming a league are currently being investigated by a committee from the Birchwood Comm. Club. and will be published as soon as they are obtained.

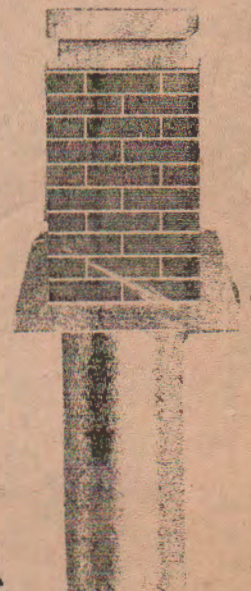
