CHUGIAK: Operation Chugiak Nigh School has found a powerful friend in the person of Govenor Um. Egan, who met with the executive board of that organization last Saturday at the Eagle River Baptist Church.

Chairman Ed. Willis gave the Govenor a run down of the aims of OCHS and told him of the reasons for needing a high school on this area.

The governor informed the group that he was not unacquainted with the need for a high school in Chugiak and has been in favor of one for some time. He further said that a survey was to be made of the educational needs throughout the state, and that the information to be gathered by OCHS would help immeasurably. When asked if OCHS could count on the support of the Governors admisnistration, his answer was in the affirmative.

At a meeting of OCHS on Monday, June 125 reports showed that the census was nearly complete and would be in the hands of the compliation committee by Friday.

Five additional organizations were represented at this meeting bringing the total up to 27.

Mrs. Ralph Long reported that contributions from several of the community organizations had brought the treasury up to \$55.

There will be another meeting of the group on Londay, June 19th at 7:30nm at the Chugiak VFW Hall at mile 21.

A RECORD TO BE PROUD OF

Only last week we were speaking of what the people of Chugiak can accomplish through working together.

The other day a matter was brought to our attention that is but another example of the same thing. Through the concerted effect of working toward a common cause, the people of Chugiak have achieved a record unequaled in the entire State.

All communities in Alaska are required to pay a specified sum to the Department of Health and Welfare, which is used to provide the services of a public health nurse for their area.

According to information which was recently given to Ers. Ralph Long, President of the Chugiak Health Council; Chugiak is the only community in the entire State of Alaska which has consistantly met this obligations.

Now this is indeed a mecord to be proud of.

In the past the people of Chugiak paid this money from funds raised by the community sponsored CBA Carnival.

Then CBA no longer hal the money to pay for the nurse, the ladies clubs of the area (next col.)

under the leadership of the Chugiak Ladies Club (then known as the Friendly Neighbors), pitched in and held a bazaar, at which the needed \$400 was raised.

Now once again the time as rolled around when this payment is due.

The people of Chugiak have a wonderful record to preserve, and it appears that they do not intend to let the Department of Health down.

Already some of the clubs have voted funds from their treasury to help meet this need; and it is expected that more will do so.

Four hundred dollars is a sizeable sum of money, and it will take a bit of effort to raise it; but the public health nurse benefits all of us, and we feel sure that the people of this unusual community will come through just as they have in the past, and the remarkable record of Chugiak will remain intact for another year.

% cup raisins (opt) FCRN dough into small balls the

size of valuuts

DCLL each ball in sugar mixture

PLICI in greased angel food pan
in staggered rows and layers
until all dough is used

DAME at 350° for 45 minutes TURN out on plate or board while still hot.

The Peters Creek Community Club met on June 32 at the home of Bruce Robinson for the purpose of electing new officers, and to undertake several items of community concern.



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
