A WORD OF CAUTION

With the advent of summer, it  
seems that many youngsters are  
begging for motor scooters,  
motor bikes or some type of  
power driven vehicle.

Donald Westley, of the State  
Dept. of Public Safety, be-  
lieves that parents be advised  
of the State Law governing  
the operation of any of the  
above vehicles.

A child thirteen years or  
older may operate a motor  
vehicle which does not exceed  
five horsepower. However,  
a special license to operate  
the vehicle must be purchas-  
ed. This license costs two  
dollars for two years, and  
may be used until the youth  
is sixteen years of age, after  
which a regular drivers lic-  
ense must be obtained.

Proof of age and a parental  
consent form must also be pre-  
sented.

Parents are also required to  
sign a form in which they as-  
sume all responsibility for  
any wilful misconduct or neg-  
ligence which may occur by  
reason of operation of the  
vehicle.

Any deviation from the ab-  
ove constitutes the breaking  
of the law.

In the event of a child  
operating a motorized vehi-  
cle without a license, or  
operating a vehicle of great  
er horsepower than the lic-  
ense permits the parents  
are liable for any accident  
or damage which may result.

It was felt that many par-  
ents are of the opinion that  
a drivers license is unnec-  
essary when operating such  
vehicles and a word of cau-  
tion at this time may pre-  
vent considerable trouble  
in the future.

Drivers licenses may be  
obtained from Mr. Westley  
at the Chugiak Post Office  
every Thursday between 1 and  
4pm.

The two recipes which Leanore gives us this week would either one make an ideal contribution to a pot luck dinner. One a hearty salad, and the other an unusual one dish meal.

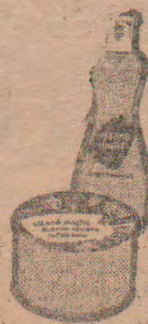

## SEATTLE FIRM BIDS LOW ON EAGLE RIVER LOOP

JUNEAU: M-B Contracting Company of Seattle has entered the low bid of \$91,635 for grading and drainage of a little more than a mile of the Eagle River Loop Road.

Richard M. Downing, Commissioner of the State Department of Public works said that the Seattle firm's unchecked bid was the lowest of four read.

Other bids read were from S.S. Mullen Inc. of Seattle, \$94,617; Roster Saunders Inc. of Spenard, \$104,156; and Cheny Construction Company of Seattle, \$107,092.


Downing said that a fifth bid was received also, but is being held unread to see if a promised bid bond was mailed prior to the mailing deadline.


The project consists of grading, and draining 1.208 miles of the loop road and will require an estimated 25 acres of clearing and grubbing.

The engineer's estimate was announced by Downing as \$68,179, nearly \$23,500 less than the low bid entered by M-B.

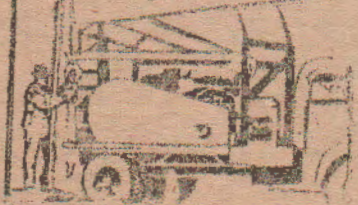

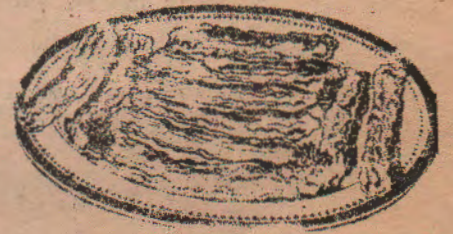

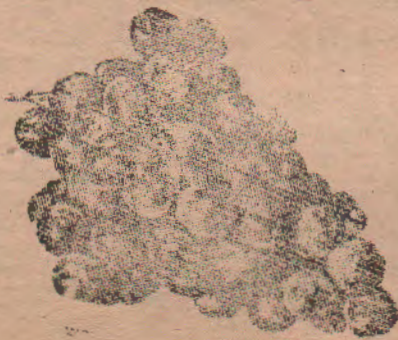
