If the Operation Chugiak High School accomplishes nothing else, it has turned up some mighty impressive figures.

The surveys and the census recently taken shows that the population of Chugiak has really been exploding and the explosion shows now sign of abating, but is still going strong.

The surveys were taken of figures covering a ten year period and concerned many phases of the community i.e. increase of electric and telephone subscribers, money taken in at the Chugiak Post Office and of course the enrollment at the Chugiak School. The increase in all of these departments has been in excess of 20% per year, with some years being in excess of 35%.

One thing for sure, even if we fail to impress the State Department of Education, we sure as heck have impressed ourselves.

Further investigation has revealed many fascinating little tidbits of information.

For example, the average (next col)

family in Chugiak has 1 1/2 Children.

Also, over 80% of the residents of the community own their own homes.

All of these interesting and in our case very vital statistics will be set forth at the public meeting which has been called for this Thursday at the Carnival Hall.

This will be the opportunity for those citizens of the community who have been more or less sitting on the sidelines to come down and find out what these OCHS people have been doing.

If you are one of the ones who has felt sort of left out, and wished that you could learn a little more about this Operation High School, don't miss this meeting.

This will probably be one of the most important public meetings to have been called in Chugiak, and each and everyone of us has a vital stake in this High School, regardless of whether not we have children.

Even if you feel that a high school will be built without your participation, come on down anyway. If nothing else, you will learn some very interesting facts about your community.

The results of the most complete survey ever taken to cover every phase of our community life will be made public; and every citizen in the community will in one way or another be represented in these facts.

Many people have worked endless hours researching this information, and now they are anxious to share it with their fellow "Chugiakans".

"The Chugiak Health Council wishes to thank those who donated to the Public Health Fund at the Poloi Clinic held June 14th Fourteen dollars and twenty was raised that evening.

Thanks are due also to the Peters Creek Community Club, who donated twenty dollars, bringing the total raised so far to \$34.20

This is still a long way from the needed \$400.00 which we are asked to raise each year to aid the Alaska Department of Health in their "fund matching" budget.

Most communities can raise this through taxes, but the Chugiak area is in a rather different position, and to pay this assessment, we have to rely on voluntary contributions.

In return for this \$400 payed annually, we have made available to us, the services of the Public Health nurse, her immunization program for all school children, plus the Well Child Clinic, where (cont page 5 col 1)

The Cook of the Month



-COOK FOR JUNE -
LEANORE LINDRETH

For her final recipe, Leanore gives us a party cake that is unusual and contains a surprise ingredient.

GOLDEN STICE (pumpkin cake)

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp ground cloves
- 1/2 tsp nutmeg
- 7 large eggs (separated)
- 1/2 cup canned pumpkin
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 tsp cream of tartar

SET oven for 325°
SIFT dry ingredients together into mixing bowl
SEPARATE eggs
SET whites aside
COMBINE yolks with pumpkin, salad oil & water in small bowl
MAKE well in center of dry ingredients
ADD liquid all at once
BLEND until smooth
BEAT whites until foamy
ADD cream of tartar
beat 3 to 5 minutes til stiff
FOLD into pumpkin batter
POUR into ungreased ten inch tube pan
BAKE 55 minutes at 325°
RAISE temperature to 350°
BAKE additional 15 minutes
REMOVE from oven and invert
FROST with Maple Walnut Frosting.

MAPLE WALNUT FROSTING
1/2 cup butter or oleo

(cook of the month)

- 1 pound powdered sugar
- 1/3 cup canned milk
- 1/2 tsp maple flavoring
- 1 1/2 cup walnut meats

CREAM butter in large bowl
ADD half of the sugar gradually
CONTINUE creaming until light and fluffy
BLEND in canned milk
ADD remaining sugar and cream until spreading consistency
STIR in maple flavoring
SPREAD on cake
COVER with walnuts while frosting is still moist.

TAKING OF GAME IN DEFENSE OF LIFE OR PROPERTY MUST BE REPORTED

JUNEAU: The Alaska Department of Fish and Game reminded the Public today that although the Alaska Game Regulations specifically provide that game animals may be killed in defense of life or property, this regulation also provides that a written report giving the circumstances of such taking must be made to the Department within 15 days.

James W. Brooks, Director of the Division of Game, stated that there must have been several instances of persons taking game in defense of life or property in various areas of the State this spring, and in almost all of these cases, it was necessary for Department personnel to make an investigation to find the persons involved and request them to submit a report as required by the regulations.

Brooks pointed out that the "emergency taking" provision was amended by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game to provide that reasonable effort must be made to protect life or property by means other than the destruction of game.

The change was made, Brooks said, because some people had been using the regulation as an excuse for wantonly shooting big game animals, while other people were leaving garbage cans and refuse in places where they would attract bears and then shooting the bears, rather than making any attempt to clean up the refuse.

Bears, moose and bison are the animals which most frequently threaten life or property in Alaska; these animals can frequently be frightened away by shooting over their heads, or shouting and often would present no problem if the causes of their being attracted to the vicinity of

humans were removed.

If it does become necessary to shoot them, a Department representative should be called as soon as possible, said Brooks, and a written report must be submitted within 15 days.

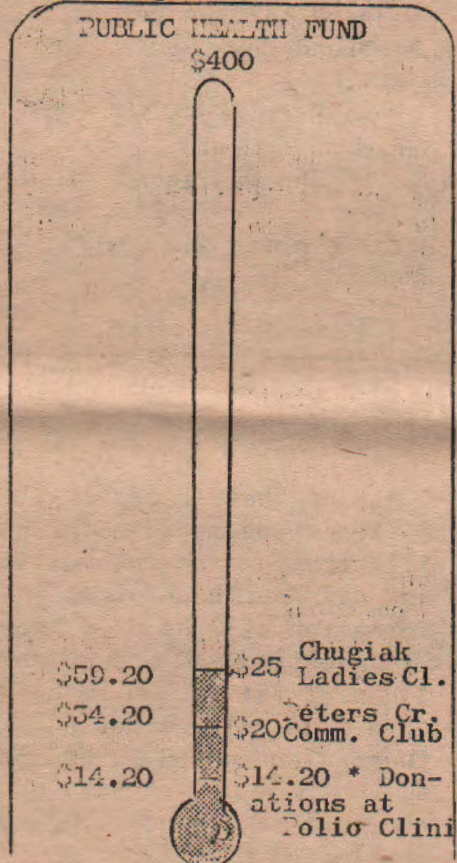
THE HEALTH THERMOMETER
