Area Wide Census To Kick Off "OCHS"

A complete, accurate, up-to-date census of the entire area from the Eagle River Bridge on is the first step to be completed in "OPERATION HIGH SCHOOL".

This was one of the main facts established at a meeting which included representatives from 21 of the 27 known clubs and organizations within the Chugiak area. Acting as moderator at the meeting was Ed Willis, Pres. of the Chugiak L.L.

who was there representing that organization.

This census will begin on Friday, June 9th, and is to be completed by the following Friday.

A chairman was elected to take charge of each of the areas within Chugiak. In charge of the Peters Creek area, is Mrs. Ray Beam, Birchwood, Mrs. Roger Jonrowe, Old Chugiak, Mrs. Gib Reid, Fire Lake, Elmer Richardson, Eagle River Mrs. Cyrus McAllister. Carl Sand will cover the Lutna - Goat Creek area.

The organization, which adopted the official title of "Operation Chugiak High School, also elected officers. Ed Willis was voted the Chairman with Dale Pierson co-chairman. Secretary, Mrs. Paul Jones and treasurer Mrs. Ralph Long.

Numerous facts were brought to the attention of the group by Mrs. Guy Johnson who had met with Mr. George T. Keefe of the State Dept. of Education. Mr. Keefe had told her that a survey of available land suitable for a high school would be required of land

THE GREEN THUMB CORNER

A few weeks ago, in a gardening editorial, we confessed our inability to grow beets, and asked for suggestions. Well, help has come from an unexpected corner.

Mr. Lew Hanks, District Agricultural Agent for the Extension Service in Palmer, writes as follows... "fertilize each row before planting with about a cupful of commercial fertilizer for every 10 feet of the row, plus not over 1/10 of a teaspoon of borax.

Mix in the fertilizer and then plant. Use beet variety EARLY WONDER. Thin the beets early and hope for the best."

Mr. Hanks also included a copy of the extension service bulletin, Gardens in Alaska, from which we may from time to time reprint choice items.

We would like to hear from more of you about your problems, or tips on gardening in Alaska.

One lady complains that the plants in her rhubarb bed come up year after year but the stalks are either scrawny or short. She wonders what care or fertilizer she should use to help them. Any suggestions?

in the area. This land would have to be located on the main highway, and be a minimum of 20 acres. It would also be advisable to be located as far geographically from Anchorage as was possible in order to assure the chance of the legislature approving it. Carl Steeby was appointed to head a committee to investigate available land.

Once the primary goal of a census is completed the information will be turned over to a compilation committee, headed by Mrs. Jack Frankfourth who will consolidate all the data and prepare detailed maps which will show the entire area and will have the population indicated by colored buttons. This and all the other information which the committees are to gather will be presented to Dr. Theodore Norby, head of the Department of Education next month.

It was pointed out by Mrs. Johnson, that the reason for this urgency is that if ap- (next col.)

(high school)

proval for Chugiak High School can be obtained before the borough system is in effect, then the school would be built at no cost to the residents of Chugiak. Mrs. Johnson said that under the present system 95% of the cost would be borne by the Federal Government and 5% by the State. She cited the example of the High School which is currently under construction in Wasilla.

Bill Lowe will be publicity chairman, and it is of prime importance that all the citizens of Chugiak realize the necessity of the operation, and cooperate with the census takers to the fullest. This census will serve a twofold purpose, in that it will also provide the information for the census which is taken each summer for the Chugiak elementary school.

A meeting of OCHS has been called for next Monday, June 12th at the VFW hall mile 21 at 7:30pm. Any organizations which failed to send a representative to the last meeting are urged to do so at the next one.

In order to obtain sufficient funds to defray any expenses which are bound to arise, it was decided to ask for donations from the various organizations represented at the meeting. Donations from individuals and businesses would also be welcomed. a donation of \$10 from one of the individuals present at the meeting was the beginning of the group's treasury.

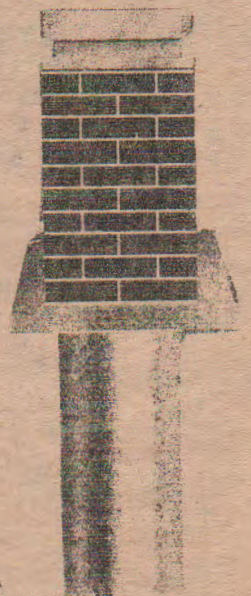
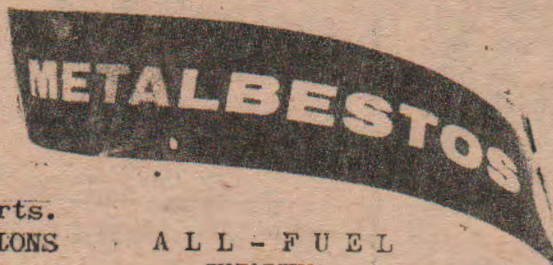

BAKE at 350° for 10 minutes

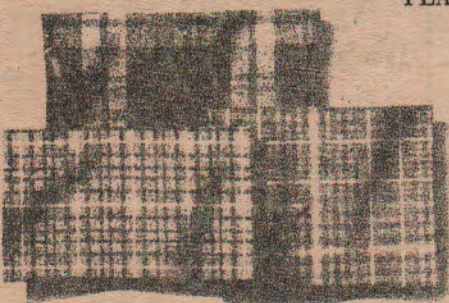

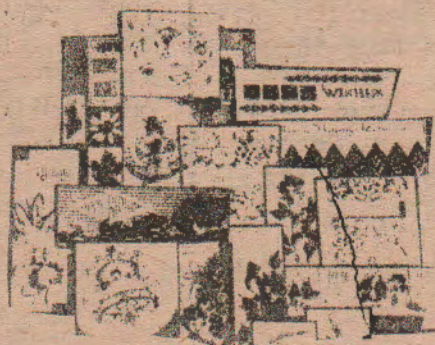
