All organizations are urged to see that their delegates attend this meeting and be prepared to vote on acceptance of the report.

We have heard occasional complaints that the COURIER is too serious.

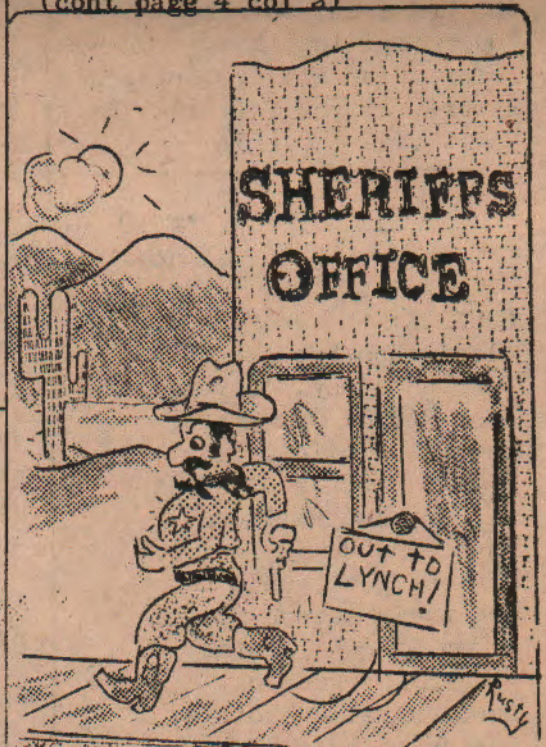
Beginning this week we hope to lighten our grim format with an occasional bit of humor such as the cartoon at the right.

He asked that all who were involved in preparing the report to be sure and come down as his guests even if their invitation does not arrive.

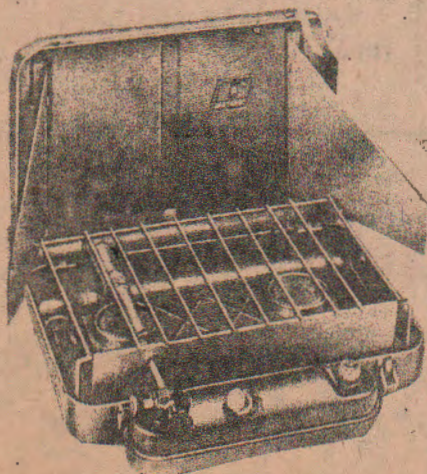

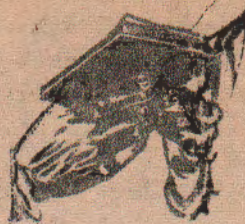

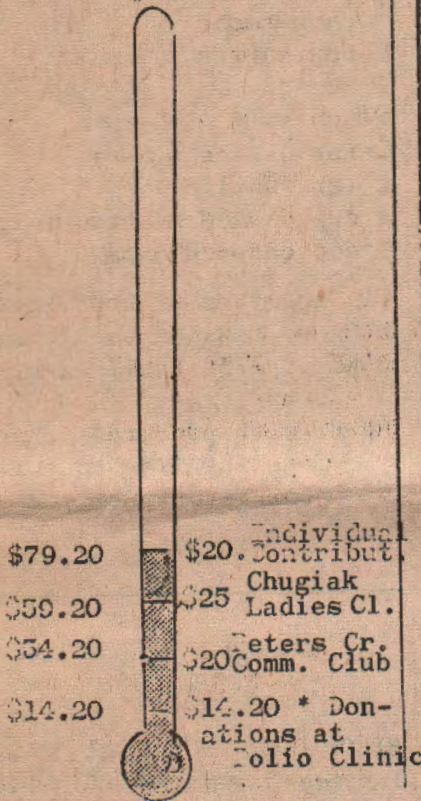
HEALTH COUNCIL TURNS TO COMMUNITY FOR FUNDS

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. responded with the ambulance and transported the injured men to the 5040th Air Force Hospital.

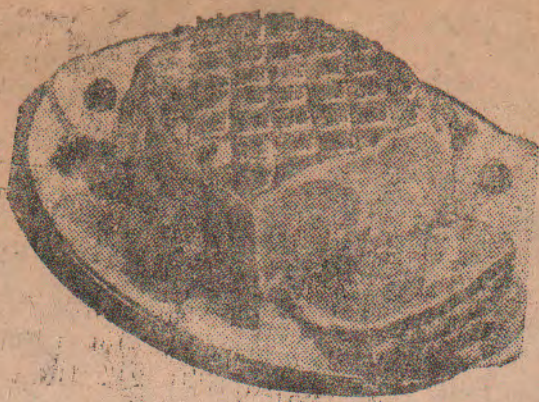

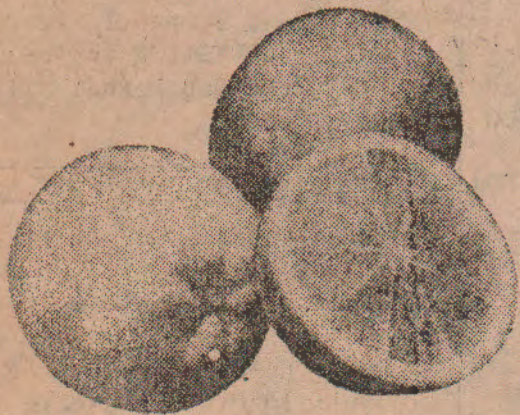
