LET IVAN DO IT!

The problem of Civil Defense is not exclusively an American one. The people of Russia are every bit as concrened with it as we are.

However, as an article in the August issue of Pageant points out, the Soviet Union has gone about solving the problem_ip an entirely different manner.

The main difference in the American and the Russian outlook seems to be the attitude of fatality with which the average American regards' nuclear warfare. We all believe that such a war would spell the end of civilization as we know it, with no hope for mankind whatsoever.

The Russians, however, have been taught that survival in an atomic war is no different than survival in any other type of combat, provided that certain known procedures are fållowed.

In the Soviet Union Civil Defense Training in both thorough and mandatory, with no one exempt from participation.

The Russians are taught how: to decontaminate food, clothing etc from radioactive dust and how to speedily clean up

a fallout area.

Repeated drills in this procedure has taken most of the terror out of the prospect of an attack for them, and made panic something that they are not likely to have to contend with.

The Russians expect to loose many millions in an all out atomic war, but not nearly as many as are expected to be lost on the American side.

In the showdown of training survival, we should not be content to "let Ivan do it", but to take a page from the Russian book on Civil Defense, and face up to the facts.

If we do we may find like the Russians have, that they are not nearly as hopeless as they seemed, and that survival is merely the applic ation of common sense and not giving way to panic.

Every American should read the Pageant article, and then wake up and keep on living.

ANCHORAGE CHAPTER OF CYSTIC FIBROSIS FOUNDATION

ANCHORAGE: Mrs. Ed. Cartmill of Birchwood has announced the first meeting of the Anchorage Chapter of the National Custic Eibrosis Foundation to be held August 17th at 7:30pm at the home of Mrs. Jack Lee at 5706 Ladd St., Munaka Valley.

Mrs. Cartmill, whose two year old son is the victim of this little known disease stated that membership in the group was not limited to parents of afflicted children, but to anyone interested in knowing more about and in helping to find a cure to what is now considered an incurable disease.

A discription of the symptoms states that 'Cystic fibrosis does its mischief in infants and children in three ways: FIRST, it changes the mucus secretions in the lungs into a hick sticky substance, clogging the air passages and causing chronic infection, often fatally. SECOND, it produces same kind of extremely thick and sticky secretions in the pancreas, blocking the flow of vital digestive juices to the small intestine, thus seriously upsetting normal digestion and elimination. THIRD, it produces an abnormally high concentration of salt in the sweat of the CF ... i patient, weakening the child and making him prone to heat prostration."

"Cystic fibrosis_is the most common chronic disease of infancy and childhood.

It actually begins before birth and it is estimated that about one in every 1,000 American babies is born with the disease. Half of them die before they are five years old."


It's here again! Hunting season, I mean, and here goes my husband all ready to go BANG and fill our freezer with all kinds of weird animals.


He goes hunting every fall, and always gets his limit of everything, which we, his family are expected to get all eaten up by the next year.

As for the lids; it sounds as though they don't realize they're being abused...let them have their moose, they are probably happy enough.



To end the weekend, we had a rousing scavenger hunt, followed by a weiner roast.


LDS CUURCH FORMS NEW ALASKA STAKE



CRANES NOW LEGAL GAME

JUNEAU© Of special interest to many Alaskan hunters will be the opportunity to hunt cranes for the first time.

These birds are very wary, and it is doubtful that many will be taken until hunters develop the necessary knowledge and experience to outwit these birds.

Cranes have been hunted in Mexico on a limited scale for many years, and it has been found that silhoutte decoys may sometimes be used to excellent advantage.

The department of Fish and Game would like to evaluate this first crane season and it appeals to all hunters who take these birds to report their harvest, either directly to department personnel in the field or by mail to the Juneau office.

It is suggested that hunters contact the nearest office of the U.S. Weather Bureau to obtain information on sunrise and sunset times dur⁴ ing the course of the waterfowl season.

published Waterfowl Regulations for details concerning legal methods find means for taking waterfowl.


