CHUGIAK: Superintendent of Chugiak Schools E.C. (Chuck) Smith announced that the turnout for the pre-registration was very good, and on the basis of information gained the boundary between the Chugiak and Eagle River School Students has been set at road which bounds the Pip-pel sub-division at mile 14½, just at Harry's Garage.

All Students living north of this line will attend the Chugiak School. All those south of the line the Eagle River School.

Smith said that 614 students registered during the three day period last week. He estimates this to be approximately 80% of those who will actually attend on opening day

Of the above number from 250 to 320 came from the Eagle River Area.

Smith also pointed out that the boundary is a flexible one and will be moved when change in school population warrents it.

Since most of the growth is anticipated to be in the Eagle River area, the boundary will be moved farther to the south as is necessary. It may even be necessary to change the boundary during the middle of the school year, should a sudden change in the population should occur.

Chugiak has had more than it's share of crime, up to and including murder, and some are beginning to wonder if it takes one of the latter to get the attention of the State Police.

In several cases, when a party has called the Anchorage Office, they have been informed that this area lies in the jurisdiction of the Palmer Office.

If this is the case it is news not only to the residents of Chugiak, but also to the State Police in Palmer.

Actually an area as wide spread as Chugiak and with as large a population would warrant an officer to be assigned to cover this area exclusively.

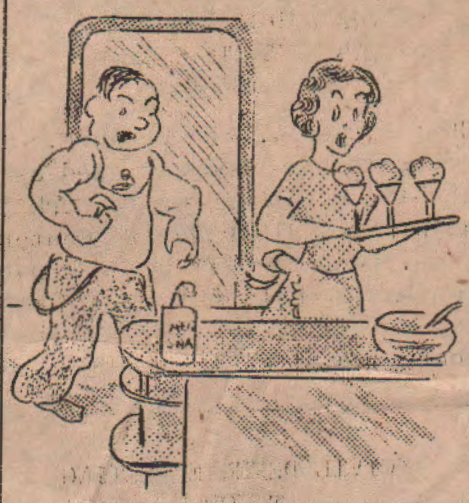
We would certainly be interested in knowing what is (next col.)

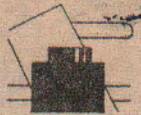

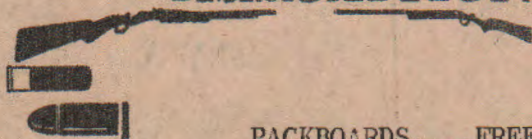

Kimbrell notified the State Police, and said that they had the matter under investigation. Kimbrell also said that the identity of those guilty is known. He said (next col.)

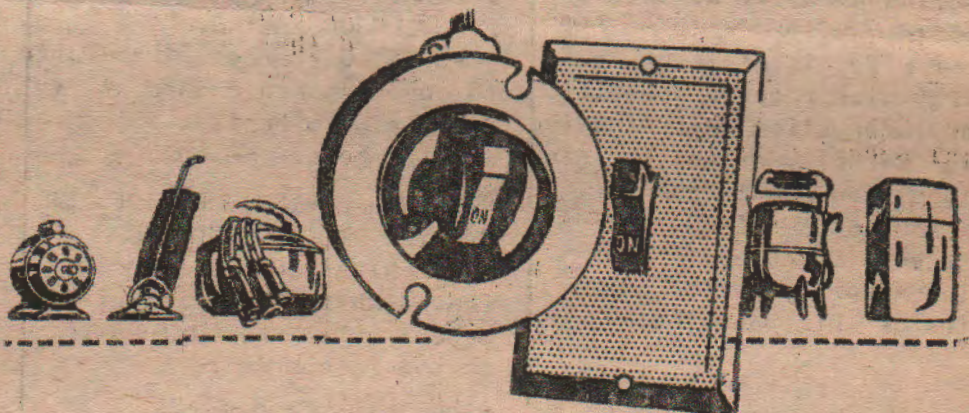

Social Security



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

QUESTION: I know that social security includes old-age retirement and death benefits.

Recently I have been suffering from arthritis, but have continued to work. My condition has become progressively worse.

What protection would my wife and I have, if I were no longer be able to work?

ANSWER: If you were no longer able to work and have had at least five years of employment covered by social security in the ten years prior to the start of your disability, you may qualify to receive monthly social security disability benefits.

Your wife, if at least age 62, may also receive benefits.

For information regarding the social security disability provisions, you should ask for the pamphlet, OASI-29, "If You Become Disabled." Your social security office has copies of this pamphlet.

QUESTION: Does a man of 69 have to quit work entirely to collect social security benefits?

ANSWER: No. You can earn up to \$1,200 and receive all your benefits for the year.

If you earn over \$1,200, some of your benefits will be withheld during the year.

Earlier in the day a local boy passing the same spot on a bicycle, and reported that someone had shot at him, hitting his front tire.

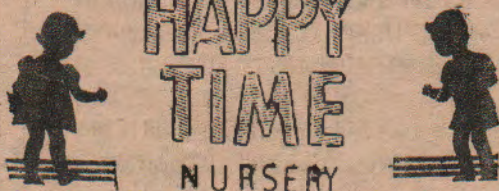
Mr. Allen attempted to learn more about the incident by questioning local youngsters and their parents, but was unable to learn anything.
